The rate of growth is, of course, much less during the dormant period of deciduous trees in the winter months, but the tree is, nevertheless, growing and, if a careful measurement is made at the beginning and end of the dormant period, this fact will be clearly brought out.

Inca Gold Excavated Among treasures reported to have been discovered during the excavation of Inca tombs in Ecuador are gold nuggets as large as lemons. The tombs are on Alamos ranch. In them were found 140 gold nuggets, gold armor, necklets and other valuables.

Beauty's Day Off A forgotten law barring women from the hairdressing shops in Paris on Monday mornings has been brought to light by a newspaper which urges its repeal. Why the law ever was passed is unexplained.
