S. P. DISCONTINUES SHASTA SERVICE HERE

Southern Pacific passenger trains Nos. 7 and 8, the "Shasta," will be discontinued between Portland and Grants Pass effective Monday, March 27, according to information received here from C. E. Kennedy, passenger traffic manager, Portland.

At present the "Shasta" leaves Cottage Grove at 12:41 p. m. southbound and arrives at 1:23 p. m. northbound. Schedule of the "Oregonian" trains Nos. 329 and 330 between Portland and Ashland via the Shastaville line, will be unchanged. This train leaves here at 1:55 a. m. northbound and 1:21 a. m. southbound.

Lack of patronage made the discontinuance necessary, according to Kennedy.

The Shasta was scheduled to be taken off duty March 20 but was put back after southern Oregon communities objected.

Bus mail service between Eugene and Grants Pass is to be maintained but details have not yet been received.

Roseburg, Ore., March 21. — The Roseburg chamber of commerce today protested against removal of Shasta trains on the Southern Pacific route. Directors charged that the railroad is deliberately attempting to discredit the Shasta route and favor the Natron cut-off.

BUSINESS TO BOOM IS OPINION M. W. AUDITOR

That well-known business "corner" just around which we have been lurking for some long time now is right before us and ready to be turned.

This optimistic view was brought to Eugene by H. L. Pearson, regional manager of the Montgomery Ward company covering the Pacific coast area.

"We are having a meeting of 35 store managers of the company from Oregon, Washington and Idaho and every store head is to be told to buy heavily to complete stocks. Every store will be forced to buy now as the company expects and is warranted in that expectation that business will be heavy this coming summer and fall," Mr. Pearson declared.

"Buy, and buy and buy because we are going to sell and sell and sell," is the slogan for the Portland conference.

This heavy purchasing which will be repeated throughout the Montgomery Ward organization will mean a big impetus to manufacturing.

"We are also going to purchase whenever possible all merchandise in the state where the stores are located," Mr. Pearson explained.
