Whereas gray digger ground squirrels (Citellus douglasii) are noxious rodents in Lane county, Oregon;

Now, therefore, all of such persons, firms, copartnerships, corporations and companies owning or having dominion over land in said Lane county, Oregon, are hereby required to take steps to exterminate said gray digger ground squirrels (Citellus douglasii) within 30 days from the date of the first publication of this notice. If such steps are not taken, a person or persons appointed by the county court of said Lane county will enter upon said lands and proceed to exterminate said gray digger ground squirrels (Citellus douglasii) and the cost of said extermination will be levied against said lands.

The county agricultural agent hereby designates Monday, April 10, as a day to be known as "squirrel poisoning day" throughout the county of Lane county, Oregon, and recommends that poisoned barley as prepared by the undersigned and representatives of the bureau of biological surveys of the United States department of agriculture be used for the purpose of such extermination. I, the Medicine Closet

It is well to keep the medicine closet in a more or less cataloged condition by at least keeping the medicines for internal use and those for external use on different shelves. Keep any poison marked in some way and in a place where it is quite an effort to get to, then there cannot be a mistake.

GRADUAL UPTREND IN BUSINESS PREDICTED

New Services to Take up Slack in Employment Caused by Machines.

A gradual but immediate business revival of business was predicted by Dr. Victor P. Morris of the economics department of the University of Oregon, who was the speaker at an evening of entertainment Thursday of last week sponsored by the Masonic lodge.

Dr. Morris, in the course of an "Some Problems of Economic Recovery," pointed out many things responsible for the depression. He expressed the belief that no one could see the light at the end of the tunnel of confidence and fear were the greatest factor. "With money pouring back into the banks," he said, "a revival in this country is certain, but there can be no way of recovery as long as European countries are saddled with debt that represents no production of any kind. The only way European countries can pay us is to trade with us, and we erect tariff walls against them for our own protection."

The speaker indicated that an original debt, the annual payments upon which would have been more than all the money in the world, already paid many times, probably will have to be paid still further before there can be world prosperity in which we may share.

The decreased value of securities of every kind and of products were explained as largely due to the fact that in 1929 everyone decided that he wished to liquidate, and there is not enough money in the country to make it possible for all to liquidate at once. "There is plenty when only part of us want to liquidate and others are willing to buy."

In this machine age, Dr. Morris explained, industrial employment has been decreased, but the period of greatest employment came 10 years after the war, and greater industrial employment. This additional employment was brought about through various new services, and the speaker expressed the belief that other new services will be developed to again give employment to those whom machines have displaced, while the working and working week will be shortened to give us time to enjoy these new services.

Preceding the lecture a delightful musical program was given by Mrs. E. H. Wright and Mrs. E. H. Pearson, vocalists, and Clifford Constance, pianist, all of Eugene.

COUNTY DISTRIBUTES FOODSTUFFS TO NEEDY

Over 11,000 Cans of Fruit and Vegetables Available for Distribution.

Over 8965 cans of foodstuffs have been distributed through county relief work and there remains 11,912 cans of fruit and vegetables in the county store room according to a recent report of Howard N. Morse, caretaker.

This represents foodstuffs donated the county or provided through the county's cooperative cannery and the Red Cross plan for providing jars on a percentage basis.

Since the distribution was started the foodstuffs distributed, 4925 cans of vegetables, with 1792 remaining. The entire supply of meat and fish, 1757 cans of salmon and mutton steak, has been given out. Of the 4,404 cans of fruit, 2283 have been given out. There were seven tons of dried prunes at the opening of the storeroom, and but four and a half tons remain.

In addition there has been distributed two truckloads of flour, hams, canned foods of various kinds, given by the forest service at the close of the fire season.
