FOUR-H CLUB MEMBERS START RODENT CONTEST

Third Annual Control Project to Begin April 1 and Will Close May 25.

The third annual rodent contest for Lane county and all club members sponsored by the Lane county agricultural council in connection with its rodent control program, has been set to run from April 1 to May 25.

The contest is cash prizes will be awarded to those earning the most points in the contest. Enrollments in the contest must be made with R. C. Kuennen, county club agent, by April 15.

First place winner will be awarded \$250 and must score 250 or more points; second place \$2, with 200 or more points; third place \$150, with 150 or more points; fourth place \$1, with 100 or more points, and fifth place 50 cents with 50 or more points.

The club or group scoring the highest with at least three groups participating and scoring 500 points or over will be awarded \$250.

Moles and pocket gophers count 5 points, grey diggers, rats and rabbit tails one point each, and mice tails one-half point. Any method of control is allowed. The object of the contest is to eliminate as many rodents as possible and any assistance the contestant can secure will be permitted.

One hundred mole traps have been loaned to the club members by C. K. Greife of Portland for use in the contest.

Wilbur Dehne of Dehorn was high point man in the contest last year. He caught 1993 mice, 9 grey diggers and 4 rats. Ninety-six boys and girls in the contest last year exterminated 621 pocket gophers, 190 moles, 362 grey diggers, 690 and 5415 mice.

Rodent control supervisors as well as 4-H club leaders will assist in the contest.

GOLD MINING COURSE TO START SATURDAY

Oregon Mining Congress Sponsors Free Class in Practical Instruction.

University of Oregon, Eugene, March 30. Practical aid for those who feel the urge to seek out the gold in the hills of Oregon will be given to all who care to register for a short course for miners, to be conducted by the Oregon Mining congress and the general extension division of the Oregon system of higher education April 1 to June 3, it was announced today by R. M. Betts, Eugene, president of the congress.

Gold exists in many sections of Oregon, and many persons not now employed may be able to learn enough to earn money prospecting and mining, it is declared. At the same time experienced miners may be able to pick up additional knowledge through the course.

A corps of experts, including geologists and mining engineers from the college and the university and practical miners of the state, has volunteered to act as teaching staff. The course will be free. Registration may be made at the Eugene chamber of commerce by letter or by appearing in person any time before the course starts.

The list of the instructors for the course: Dr. Warren D. Smith, geologist, University of Oregon; R. M. Betts, Eugene, a successful miner; Dr. E. T. Hodge, professor of geology at Oregon state college; John Thompson, State College of Washington; J. H. Hatchell, professor of mining engineering at Oregon state college, and W. L. Skinner and E. E. Morrison, Eugene, miners.

Shasta Train Service Will Be Maintained

The Shasta train service between Portland and Grants Pass, which was to have been discontinued Monday, will not be suspended, the Southern Pacific company has notified Charles Thomas, utilities commissioner. As far as can be learned here, this fine is final and the famous rail train will continue on its regular run.

Opposition to suspension came from Roseburg and Grants Pass. Roseburg charged the railroad with unfair discrimination against the Shasta route in favor of the Natron cut-off and declared that the company was violating an agreement with the United States government to maintain adequate train service to the northwestern national soldiers' home.

The Shasta leaves Cottage Grove at 12:41 p. m. southbound and arrives at 3:23 p. m. northbound.
