CITY COUNCIL PROVIDES FOR RESTRICTIONS ON CONSUMPTION BEER

Arbitrary Powers Retained for Granting and Revocation of Licenses.

The city council has acted to provide for the sale of beer as permitted by recent enactment of congress and for the present Cottage Grove will license sales, this despite the fact that dry forces had urged that distribution be made as easy and as unrestricted as possible.

Sale of Beverage Must Be in Open, Heavy Penalties Are Provided.

A large gallery attended the Monday night meeting of the city law making body at which provisions of the proposed ordinance were discussed, but there was no action when the ordinance was adopted at an adjourned meeting held Tuesday night.

Main provisions of the ordinance, adopted by the emergency clause, are as follows:

Licenses fees: Fifteen dollars a quarter for general retailer, \$10 a quarter for package dealer, \$5 a year for wholesaler. A petition for a material reduction in these fees was presented to the council last night after The Sentinel had gone to press.

No disorderly conduct shall be permitted upon premises of dealer, no sales shall be made to intoxicated persons, no sales shall be made to persons under the influence of age and no sales shall be made between midnight and 5 a. m.

Premises of dealers shall be so arranged that all sales and consumption shall be in full view from the street in front of the premises. Police officers may at any time inspect premises upon which sale is being made and may test alcohol content of beverages being dispensed or on the premises for any purpose. Amendment of this section was to be considered last night.

Licenses may be revoked at the pleasure of the council and penalties for violation of the ordinance are a fine not exceeding \$200 or a jail sentence of not more than 100 days.

The council is given arbitrary power to refuse to grant any license and it is provided that a good moral character is one of the principles of this government. Must be 21 years of age, must be in full possession of his mental faculties and shall dispense beverages only from the place for which license is granted.

No license shall be granted for the sale of beverages at a location within a block of any school or church, nor shall sale be permitted in pool room, billiard room, card room, dance hall or skating rink. Amendment of this section was to be considered last night.

It shall be unlawful to consume beverages in any public place except upon the premises of a general retailer.

Applications for the sale of beverages shall be made to the city recorder, who shall immediately transmit such applications to the license committee of the city council, which shall make investigation and report at the next regular meeting of the city council.

Conflicting ordinances have been repealed.

It has been recognized that regulations provided may not prove satisfactory and that changes may have to be made frequently to the end that the sale of 3.2 per cent beer may be made to the satisfaction of the public.

That is one reason for granting licenses for periods of only three months at a time.

Sale of beer is expected to start today, although there is some doubt as to a sufficient supply. Action upon applications for licenses was taken by the council last night after The Sentinel had gone to press.

That there should be no restraint placed upon the sale of beer of an alcoholic content declared by the president and congress to be non-intoxicating and that it be dispensed in the same manner as any non-intoxicating drink was the position taken by the dry forces of the city. Their position was presented by Rev. E. G. Shaw of the Christian church, who said in part: "The reason given for the need of legislation to permit the sale of beer of an alcoholic content of 3.2 per cent was that such beer is necessary to balance the national budget and save the national credit. The president and the congress have solemnly promised that children shall drink this beer without intoxication."

"While the dry forces of the city are mindful of certain pre-prohibition beers with an alcoholic content of less than 3 per cent, that were in fact intoxicating, they realize the futility of disputing the president and the congress of the United States who jointly tell us that this beer, though having an alcoholic content of 3.2 per cent, is not intoxicating, and are willing that the word of the president and the congress be accepted without further question. We request that no other restrictions be placed upon the sale of this beer than those which the federal law demands."

"Let prejudice stand aside and an appeal to experience be had. Let this harmless beverage, by large sale and consumption, bring the credit of the nation, if by fair and impartial trial it should be found that the president and congress were mistaken. It will then be time to take steps toward restricting or doing away with its sale. If, on the other hand, we should discover that 3.2 per cent is in fact non-intoxicating, we shall have discovered what the nation needs and perhaps home brew and moonshine, which have thrived almost unrestrained by law, may find a natural restraint beyond that of police power of nation, states and municipalities."

Rev. W. V. McGee spoke briefly urging that the city seek no revenue from the sale of beer.

E. R. Morford of Klamath Falls, former resident, was employed to audit the city books at an agreed price of \$60.

An ordinance was adopted granting the county use of property owned by the city east of the Standard Oil company's plant upon which it will store county machinery. In return for use of the property, the county will do street work for the city to the amount of 6 per cent of the amount the city has invested in the property.

Annual Egg Hunt Is Planned

The annual Easter egg hunt sponsored by the Lions club will be held on the golf course as usual Saturday of next week, to start at 1:30. Boy scouts and Rainbow Girls are cooperating and about 90 dozen eggs will be prepared and hidden for the youngsters. Whether or not hen eggs or rabbit eggs will be used has not yet been determined.

5-Cent-a-Dish Lunch To Be Served

A 5-cent-a-dish cafeteria luncheon will be served at the high school noon (Friday). It is being sponsored by the junior class and will be similar to the one sponsored a week ago by the senior class. Each dish will sell for 5 cents and the menu will include chili con carne, various kinds of sandwiches, pie and coffee, chocolate or milk. The committees in charge are as follows: General chairman, Harold Mackin; food committee, Millicent Delaney; publicity, Rupert Shaw. An impromptu musical program will be given by members of the junior class. Residents of the city general and high school are urged to attend and familiarize themselves with these school luncheons.

Warrants Good Investment

Numerous persons are inquiring every day at the court house for county warrants on an investment and quite a number held by county employees are being sold. It was stated Friday by Lloyd Howe, tax collector, that warrants in the office of Sheriff Swartz.

"These warrants are a good investment, drawing six per cent interest, and are backed by the best security to be had anywhere," said Mr. Howe. "They are in good financial condition and as soon as taxes enough are collected the warrants will be paid in full with interest."

Mr. Howe said that the warrants now being issued probably would draw interest for a period of from six months to a year. Collections are looking up, he said, and they might be redeemed sooner than that.

ASSAULT ON HUNTER BRINGS 5-YEAR TERMS

Alvin Melton Morgan and Frank Falk, charged with assault upon an officer as the result of the jail break in which Jailer Floyd Hunter was severely injured by being laboring with a chunk of wood, were found guilty Saturday by a circuit court jury and have been sentenced to five years on this charge in addition to sentences on other charges for which they were held.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR TO HOLD RALLY HERE

Plans Are Now Under Way for Great County Convention April 27-30.

The challenge of the Cottage Grove Christian Endeavor, flung out by Roy Mason, president of the society, at the Lane county convention at Waterville March 25, has been accepted and the next union rally will be held at the Christian church here, it was decided at a meeting of the executive committee of the Lane county Christian Endeavor union held Sunday afternoon at the Central Presbyterian chapel in Eugene.

The date for the rally will be set in the future by the calendar committee of the union. It will not be held until shortly after the Oregon State Christian Endeavor convention, however, since Lane county union Christian Endeavorers will be too busy preparing for the entertainment of the thousands of more delegates expected in Eugene from April 27 to 30.

Convention geography takes in almost the entire state—four auto loads of Endeavorers will come from Grande Ronde union in eastern Oregon; four auto and two truck loads from Mt. Hood union; and a large truck (plus trailer) from Crater Lake union. Five unions have already exceeded their registration quota. The banner for the Lane county section of the state convention parade will close April 20. The winning society will carry the union banner in the parade and make a home. The banner is now held by Springfield, which had over 150 per cent of its active membership registered for the state convention.

INFORMATION LACKING FOREST RELIEF WORK

Belief Is Work Will Be Alotted Through Civic Committees.

So many applications for relief work are coming to the office of the forest supervisor at Roseburg that Supervisor Harpham declares it advisable that a public statement in reference to the proposed work as it pertains to the national forest be made.

His office has received from the regional forester (March 31) the following information:

"Very little is known regarding the methods of employment to be used in connection with the work. It is quite probable that the forest service will have nothing to do with the activity of recruiting the men. Another agency, such as the department of labor, will be charged with that responsibility. In any event, the recruiting office, who ever handles it, will, more than likely, cooperate with the state, county and municipal employment relief organizations and will not doubt select the men to be offered employment relief in the forest service camps from those listed with these organizations."

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FEDERAL FUNDS USED COAST FORD CLEANUP

Prevention of Further Floods Is Main Object of Relief Work.

Work of cleaning up the Coast fork as a flood control measure, as well as for beautification, was started Monday under the supervision of City Engineer Colner with a crew of five men.

The work comes under unemployment relief and the men are being paid with federal relief funds. The place of road work upon which they would otherwise be employed. It is planned to add to the number in the crew.

The chamber of commerce made the arrangements for diversion of labor from road work to this work and city officials have cooperated.

The need for cleaning up the river as a flood control measure, was emphasized by the flood in January, when streets of the city were flooded and damage of several thousand dollars resulted.

Work so far has been confined to removal of snags and brush. A dike or retaining wall of some kind is felt to be necessary, but this expense would be so high that it may not be included in the work now under way. If possible, however, that some work may be done toward cleaning up Slik creek, which was responsible to a large extent for the flood in January.

OLD AGE PENSION LAW PROVISIONS OUTLINED

Court Prepares Statement to Help Applicants; Inquiries Are Many.

Many aged persons, both men and women, in Lane county, are expected by members of the county court to apply for old age pensions when the new law passed at the last session of the state legislature goes into effect in 1934. A number already have inquired as to the provisions of the law, some of them being of the opinion that it is already in effect.

In order that those who may be planning to claim the pension may become acquainted with the provisions of the law and for the benefit of any others interested County Judge Flak has outlined a summary of the act passed by the legislature.

The act makes the county court in each county a board of commissioners to administer the law.

"No person shall be entitled to a pension having children, or other persons responsible under the law of this state for his or her support, or any minor children without just cause, is likewise not entitled to a pension."

"Severe penalties are imposed upon persons who misrepresent their condition in any way in order to get a pension. In case a person gets a pension and it later appears that he had property, the county court may recover from him twice the amount paid in pension."

"A person must have been a resident of the state of Oregon for 15 years and of the county for two years immediately preceding the date of application, and have reached the age of 70 years, and be able to qualify as to other specific provisions of the law before being eligible for a pension."

"The amount of pension will depend on findings of the commission in the sum which they may deem just after a hearing on the particular case. However, said pension shall not exceed \$30 per month in any case."

"There will be no money in the fund to pay old age pensions until taxes are open for collection in 1934. In all probability it will be several months before application blanks are received. The county court will be given notice to make application for pension may do so."

"PAT" JENNINGS WAS COLORFUL CHARACTER

Man Who Took Fortune From Bohemia Succumbs to Brief Illness.

A colorful character of the early days of the Bohemia mining district was removed with the death Thursday evening of last week of Patrick J. Jennings, Eugene. Funeral services were held Saturday forenoon at St. Mary's Catholic church, Eugene. Interment was in Mt. Calvary cemetery, Eugene.

Mr. Jennings, widely known in all the western states and Alaska, took a fortune out of Bohemia, left the district for a quarter century or more and then returned there to become associated with the development of the Lead, Crystal properties. He expected to make another fortune. He made his home in Eugene with his son, George, engineer in charge of the Lead, Crystal development. His fatal illness was a brief one.

Mr. Jennings was born in Canada and when he was 18 years old went to California. Later he returned to Canada, where he located the Noble Fir, Surprise and American Boy mines in the Saloon district of British Columbia. In 1903 he came to Oregon and secured property in the Bohemia district here, where he made a fortune.

In Idaho "Pat" Jennings was interested with Jack Keating in the Caledonia mine, which became a great producer. The Rocker Dore copper mine of the Skeena river district in British Columbia, which for years was one of the biggest producers of gold and copper in the province, was opened by Mr. Jennings and his son George. This mine was owned by the Jennings family.

In 1920 Mr. Jennings went to Baker, Ore., where he became interested in the E. E. Bailey and Elkhorn mines. Four years ago he returned to Eugene, where he had lived since.

Mr. Jennings was born March 17, 1857, at Kempeny, Ontario, Canada. He was a member of St. Mary's Catholic church, Eugene, of Knights of Columbus at Baker, and of the Western Oregon Mining congress.

He survived by his widow, Mrs. Margaret V. Jennings, Eugene; three sons, George H. Jennings, Eugene; Charles L. Jennings, Seattle; John J. Jennings, San Francisco; four daughters, Pearl Jennings and Theresa Jennings, Baker; Mrs. George O'Neill, Almira, Wash., and Sister Mary Floretta of the Sisters of the Holy Name of Seattle; four daughters, Pearl Jennings and Theresa Jennings, Baker; three brothers, James Jennings and Stephen Jennings of Ontario, Canada, Richard Jennings of Eugene.

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WARRANTS OF VARIOUS KINDS NON-NEGOTIABLE

Issuance of Scrip or of Warrants of Small Denomination Discussed.

Various methods are being considered by county officials to make negotiable payments by the county for wages and merchandise. Inability of banks to handle county paper until tax payments care for war bonds now being issued has resulted in the suggestion of county scrip, also that warrants be issued in smaller denominations, so that they may be more readily handled by business houses.

Eugene banks are for the present handling state warrants marked not paid for want of funds and one bank has agreed to make loans up to 60 per cent on city, county and school district warrants.

County officials have declared that if tax receipts approximate those of last year, Lane warrants will not get more than two months in arrears.

Portland bond houses are said to be willing to take Lane county warrants and school warrants at a discount, but it is desired to prevent discounting if possible.

Difficulty is being experienced with Cottage Grove city warrants. Those on the way to fund are being cashed, as money is on hand, but that condition will not prevail after June, when a heavy bond payment is made.

General fund warrants are several months in arrears and the bank is unable to handle, for the present, a greater quantity than it now has.

Warrants of outlying school districts are largely non-negotiable but a private individual took up the last issue of warrants for the local district.

No plans for issuance of scrip, or otherwise making funds available have yet been seriously discussed locally.
