FIRST OF C. C. C. MEN ARRIVE HERE SUNDAY

The first contingent of a 200-man civilian conservation corps camp to be established at the creek road in the Bohemia district will arrive here early Sunday morning, according to word received Thursday by District Ranger Pieper of the Layne creek station in the Umpqua forest. There will be about 30 men.

Garden Club

The Cottage Grove Garden club is busy planning a garden show to be held at the city hall June 16 from 2 to 9 o'clock. We hope everyone in the community who has flowers will enter one or more specimens to see them. A small admission fee of 10c will be charged, the money to be used in planting our club garden, the vacant lot north of the postoffice. The flowers will be judged and blue ribbons awarded winners, as flowers—single specimen, vase arrangement and basket arrangement. There should be four different flower shows, roses, delphinium, iris and pansies, but any others will be given consideration.

Following are some hints on arranging daisies carried from the Oregon Federation of Garden club's year book:

1.—Arrange flowers much as they grow: tall flowers in the rear, and a low spreading flower in the front, thus stimulating the entire plant.

2.—Beauty of foliage must be considered and displayed with as much thought as is given to the flowers. Avoid crowding.

3.—Reveal the grace and individual line of stem that supports the flower.

4.—The position of the highest flower should be one and one-half times the height of the container, measuring from the surface of the water, when the flowers are used.

5.—Do not be perfectly satisfied with a daisy arrangement because it is pleasing and not disturbing, but try to create something distinctive that makes it a picture which will live in the memory.

6.—Do not have the receptacle too prominent; they are special pieces of glass and material, as well as of color between the flowers and container. Let the flowers grow naturally out of the receptacle.

7.—Avoid confusion through the use of too many kinds of flowers.

8.—Avoid monotony through the use of any one kind of flower, which has little variety in shape or color.

9.—Avoid the use of imperfect flowers or foliage.

10.—Always have balance through either color, size or shape.

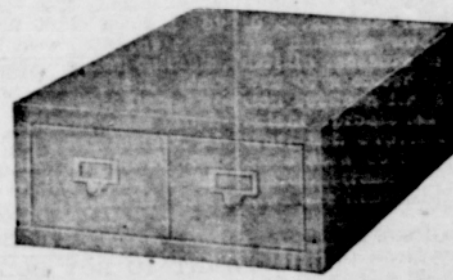

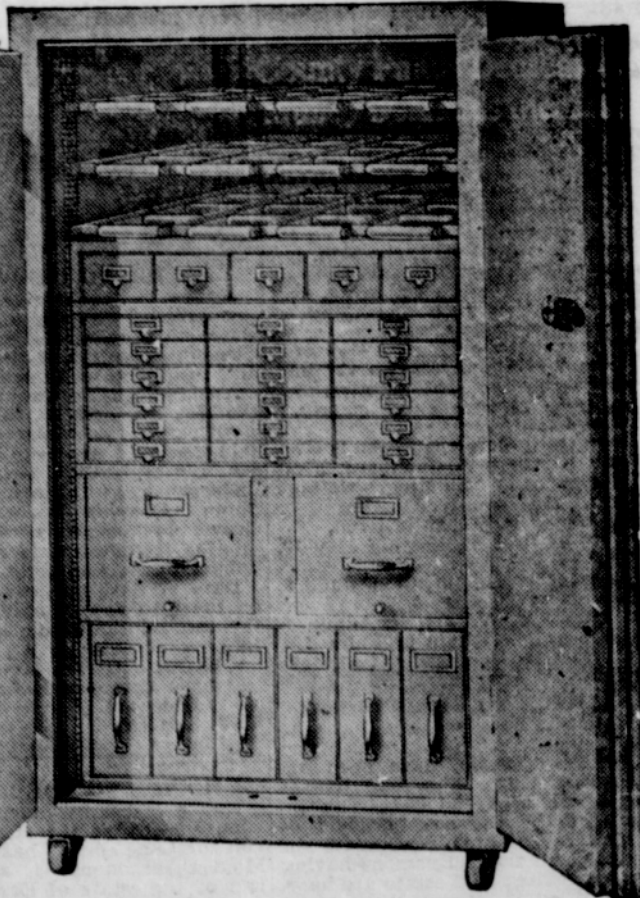
