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WEST SOLIDLY BEHIND DRASTIC LUMBER CODE

Minimum Wages, Maximum
Hours, Distribution, Pro-
duction Are Regulated.

Willamette valley lumbermen unanimously endorsed a proposed code of fair competition for the lumber industry during the Pacific Northwest Douglas fir region at a meeting in Eugene Friday evening. The code was presented by Col. W. H. Greeley, Seattle, secretary-manager of the Western Coast Lumbermen's association.

With the action of the local group, the Douglas fir region, comprising western Oregon, western Washington and part of Alaska, now stands solidly behind the proposed code.

Briefly the code suspends the provisions of the Sherman anti-trust law for the extent of the emergency period during which the national industrial recovery act is in effect. This, Col. Greeley explained, will allow lumbermen to enter into agreements that will control production of lumber to supply the demand, letting all manufacturers share equitably in the profits and prevent surplus production.

The code, which will be part of a national code to regulate the lumber industry under the provisions of the recovery act, will eliminate much regional competition, will establish minimum wage scales, maximum hours of labor, regulate distribution of lumber and allow workers to organize for the purpose of collective bargaining.

The code of fair competition for the lumber industry will be submitted to the president for approval or rejection following a meeting at Chicago June 23 when the national code will be completed. Col. Greeley declared. Upon approval of the president the code becomes a law and must be observed as such. United States district courts are authorized under the recovery act to prosecute violations of the code.

Greeley declared effects of the code would be to greatly improve the lumber industry.

"Never before has the industry had the opportunity to correct many abuses that have caused great losses to those engaged in the business and the general public," he said.

The speaker warned lumbermen against going into production too heavily on the basis of the present noticeable increase in lumber orders, pointing out that considerable buying was being done for speculative purposes and that over-production now would react unfavorably on the industry.

A spirit of optimism was expressed by lumbermen attending the meeting, which was sponsored by the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association.

DELEGATES, MEASURES UP TO PEOPLE IN JULY

Besides the election of delegates to the state convention for the ratification or rejection of the amendment to the constitution of the United States, repealing the eighteenth amendment, five measures referred to the people by the legislature, one proposed by initiative petition and two on referendum ordered by petition of the people will be voted upon by the people of Lane county at the special election July 21, according to election notices sent out by the county clerk.

Besides choosing of the six delegates to the convention voters will cast their ballots upon the following questions:

Referred to the people by the legislature: Soldiers' and sailors' bonus amendment; county manager form of government; constitutional amendment; prosecution by information and grand jury modification amendment; debt and taxation limitation for municipal corporations amendment; state power fund bonds; sales tax bill.

Proposed by initiative petition: Repeal of prohibition amendment to the constitution of Oregon.

Referendum ordered by petition of the people: Oleomargarine tax bill; granite pool bill.

Brooks, Alpha, zone 1; Truman Chase, R. F. D. 2, Eugene, zone 3; F. D. Petzold, Central, zone 4; N. O. Isaacson, Goldson, zone 5.

Car Hits Three Cows None Are Hurt

To hit three cows on the highway, see the cows walk away and some through without the car being greatly damaged was the experience of George Schneider and son Wilby and L. J. McCoy Monday night while they were returning from Eugene in the Schneider car. Wilby was at the wheel.

The cows were crossing the highway at the Lynx Hollow road intersection and were moving in line, so that there was no opportunity to circle around them. As the car came within a short distance the cows faced up the road in the direction of the car, which had been brought almost to a stop. The car hit all three, one being knocked west last side of the highway, one skidding to the other side and the third sliding up onto the hood and off the side of the car without even denting the hood. TIMBER BRIDGES MAY SPAN OREGON STREAMS

Highway Engineer Works Out
Plans for Use of Oregon
Product.

(Crew's Lumber Digest.)
Lumbermen throughout the fir-producing districts are very much interested in the prospects of the government making available money with which to construct a number of bridges on the Oregon Coast highway.

C. B. McCullough, Oregon state bridge engineer, has during the past two years originated some new and novel designs for bridge construction which have through the use of treated timbers effected tremendous savings and at the same time provided structures which will last from 30 to 40 years. It is felt by lumbermen that it is up to the northwest states to do the very thing Mr. McCullough has done, that is to use the best material available to build bridges of timber which will combine a maximum of efficiency and give the greatest economy in the long run.

The railroad department has credit for having pioneered and to a large extent developed to its present high state of efficiency the treating of timber products. In discussing this important subject C. B. McCullough, state engineer of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, recently said, "No reason or logic that I can apply will justify the added expenditure that the substitution of treated timbers for untreated materials for treated timber require."

George W. Rear, engineer of bridges for the Southern Pacific company, in commenting on the credit of having pioneered the use of timber in bridges Mr. McCullough has worked out combinations using concrete for wearing surfaces, at the same time building concrete or other materials which will outlive the requirements. Such bridges, giving a life of from 30 to 40 years, will be completely amortized before becoming obsolete. An interesting point in this connection is that the Waldport bridge, which is planned will have reinforced concrete arches on which will be superimposed treated timber concrete and beams and also be twice as long as the Rogue river bridge which is constructed entirely of concrete, will cost only half as much, setting at four to one as to the cost of the two types. As the structures now contemplated must be self-liquidating, it would seem to be sound business in sizing up the problem to hold the capital structure down to the minimum. With the ratio of cost four to one it will be quickly seen that the difference in simple interest will be 20 years or less and the experience in constructing highways during the rapid evolution of automobile transportation seen in the past 20 years makes it reasonable to presume that any bridges or highways constructed at this time will in all probability be inadequate long before a treatise on bridge will show signs of depreciation.

Dr. L. R. Hughes of the U. S. bureau of public roads at San Francisco, recently said, "The engineer of today does not know what is coming in the next 25 years and must have the vision to meet any change."

The lumber industry in the northwest feels that the actual footings of lumber going into bridges built in this immediate section is of minor importance when compared to the psychological effect on the markets of the world in demonstrating that treated timbers are suitable for construction of bridges giving permanency which will outlive the requirements and at the same time make possible great savings in public expenditures while there is a pressing need for such economy.

C. C. C. IS ADVERTISING FOR WESTERN COUNTRY

Many Boys in Forest Army
Expected to Return as
Home Builders.

While the underlying purpose of the civilian conservation corps is to get the youth of the country away from the demoralizing effects of the depression, there will be numerous by-products of this project. One of these has an advertising value for the west that should prove valuable, according to a statement issued by the public relations department of the corps.

The experiences of a great many of the young men who are or will be enrolled have been restricted in so far as an opportunity for knowing any part of the country except their own is concerned.

For those from the east who are picked up in urban districts and set down in the western conditions are quite different, the experience will unquestionably confer a broadening influence. In addition these young men, with life still ahead of them, will be given a taste of a new background that will, in all probability, lead many of them to return in future years to settle in this region.

This will be advantageous for Oregon. Many tourists who visit our section come after they have reached a state of financial independence which carries with it, in most cases, a maturity of age and attachment to some home locality elsewhere. With the young men of the civilian conservation corps this is different. They have not attained settled age nor do they have any considerable quantity of the world's goods.

Their years of activity and responsibility are still ahead of them. They seek opportunity. The climate, scenery and natural resources of the west will appeal to them. Most of them will return east at the end of their enrollment period, but many will come back to this part of the United States in future years as settlers.
