Herd Association Idea an Old One Danish Farmers Increased Milk Production 8,000 Pounds by Testing.

By M. M. Salisbury, Professor of Dairy, Ohio State University, WNU Service. Dairymen in Ohio accepted a test soon from the dairymen of Denmark when they organized dairy herd improvement associations, as they are most commonly called. The forerunners of the modern Ohio herd improvement associations were the Kontrol societies of Denmark, organized 50 years ago. The Kontrol societies, like the 30 modern Ohio dairy herd improvement associations, was formed to provide for a monthly visit of a tester. The tester weighed the milk produced by each cow in the herd and sampled it for butterfat testing. He also kept a record of feed consumed and computed production costs for each individual cow in the herd. From these records, kept year after year, the dairymen of Denmark were able to cull from their herds the poor cows and find and keep the good ones. So effective were the associations in Denmark that the country raised the average production per cow to 8,000 pounds of milk and 900 pounds of butterfat. Average production of Ohio herds is about 5,000 pounds. Testing year in and year out with an eye to the low producing individuals and their elimination from all future pedigrees offers our only hope for continued breeding of useful dairy cattle.

Herd Association Idea an Old One Danish Farmers Increased Milk Production 8,000 Pounds by Testing.

Dairymen in Ohio accepted a test soon from the dairymen of Denmark when they organized dairy herd improvement associations, as they are most commonly called. The forerunners of the modern Ohio herd improvement associations were the Kontrol societies of Denmark, organized 50 years ago. The Kontrol societies, like the 30 modern Ohio dairy herd improvement associations, was formed to provide for a monthly visit of a tester. The tester weighed the milk produced by each cow in the herd and sampled it for butterfat testing. He also kept a record of feed consumed and computed production costs for each individual cow in the herd.
