Gas, Electric Industry To Come Under NRA

The full cooperation of the gas and electric utility industry in the president's emergency reemployment program has been promised to National Recovery Administrator Hugh S. Johnson by a committee consisting of George B. Cortright, president of Edison Electric Institute, Floyd L. Carlisle, chairman of the special code committee of the institute, and Herman Russell, chairman of the special code committee of the American Gas Association.

In view of the fact that the utilities are service industries in continuous operation day and night, some modification of the president's reemployment agreement were requested by General Johnson to bring in their codes as soon as possible in order that the provisions covering these special conditions may be substituted for the provisions in the standard agreement, which are inoperative in the industries to receive the blue eagle upon execution of the modified agreement.

General Johnson stated his satisfaction in their cooperation and these industries to cooperate one hundred per cent in the movement to increase mass purchasing power and spread employment.

Error in Ad Hits McCoy Garage
