Day of the Pony Express. The first pony express started on April 3, 1830, from both St. Joseph, Mo., and San Francisco, Calif. It passed through Forts Kearney, Larabee, Bridger, Great Salt Lake City, Camp Floyd, Carson City, Washoe Silver Mines, Placerville and Sacramento. The schedule provided for an eight-day trip. The regular pony express service was discontinued upon the completion of the line of the Pacific Telegraph company in October, 1861.

Restriction on Lobbyists. In England no person is allowed to act as parliamentary agent without subscribing an obligation to observe and obey the rules and orders of the house of commons. Such persons must give bond to the sum of 500 pounds, be registered, and besides have a certificate of respectability from a member of parliament or a member of the bar.

Court Defines Box on Ear. During a trial in Frankfurt, Germany, the court was called on to define a box on the ear. The definition was: "A popular mode of chastisement which, given at the right time on the right spot with the right force for the right purpose, is unexcelled in its educative effect, and can be replaced in individual cases neither by public admonition nor draconic punishment."

Ruler's Odd Fad. In a cenotaph on the estate of the maharajah of Gwalior in India a life-size marble statue of the late ruler's mother is given today as much care and attention as she received when alive. Daily it is bathed, dressed and adorned with jewels, and meals are set before it by servants. Frequently it rests on a couch and is cooled by electric fans.
