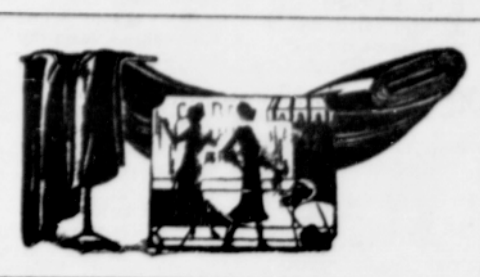

SPICY OATMEAL DROPS

1 cup sugar, 2-3 cup shortening, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup sour milk or butter-milk, 2 cups oatmeal (uncooked), 2 cups flour, 1/2 tsp. soda, 1 tsp. baking powder, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1/4 tsp. each cloves and nutmeg, 1 cup raisins, 1 cup nuts.

Cream sugar with shortening, add beaten eggs, milk, oatmeal and mix well. Sift flour, measure and sift with remaining dry ingredients. Add to creamed mixture also raisins and nuts which have been chopped. Drop from spoon on to greased pan and bake about 12 minutes in hot oven (400 degrees f.). This will make about 5 dozen cookies.
