Owen in From Placer Claim Tells Story of Search for Lost Mine

Miner Who Would Have Cheated Partner Fails to Find Lead He Had Hidden Many Years Before

Carl Owen, lone operator in the Steamboat country, was in the city Tuesday day for one of his periodical visits which come about once every six months. The Steamboat is a placer country and Owen brought along some grain sold just to get to the city. He is a mining section.

Owen arrived here about 10 years ago practically broke and had 10 cents left of his meager pile after he had outfitted and arrived at the Steamboat. He went direct to Steamboat, rigged himself a crude placer mining outfit and has been operating there ever since. He has several wintered alone, but now has a young man assisting him. Sometimes their boxes yield as much as \$20 a day. Every day they yield something, and the two are doing splendidly.

There is enough placer dirt, Owen says, to keep him going a thousand years or more, and a splendid opportunity for some big outfit satisfied to operate on dirt that runs a few dollars to the ton. However, he is not promoting anything. He is doing well, eating several squares a day and laying away something for the proverbial rainy day.

Ever hear about the fellow who returned some years ago to search for a mine he had hidden from a partner? A reporter asked carelessly, not expecting to get much information.

"Cook, Partner's name was Norlene. Yes, Cook employed me to help him try to find the mine. Cook was an old man when he returned. He took me to the place where he said the creek, pointed up the mountain and said, 'It's not over half a mile up there.' I had a difficult time getting Cook up the mountain and his physical condition was such that he couldn't get around much through the heavy brush. He was unable to locate the spot where he had found a rich piece of quartz a quarter of a century later and again I said to him, 'Herbert Leigh mining case at Eugene. He has not returned since, and I do not know whether or not he is still living.'"

"Cook's old partner, Mr. Norlene, somehow got wind of the search. Cook was making, and he too came here to try to find the lost mine. It wasn't a mine, however, for nothing had been done with the deposit, if such there was.

"The way Cook told the story to me, he and Norlene were out searching the hills one day when Cook picked up a piece of rock which he had found and put in a wire gold. Cook had assayed what he said was this rock and it was heavily laden with the precious metal. The partner, Norlene, it seems, did not stop to investigate what Cook had found and put no faith in Cook's story. Cook then evolved the idea of sending Norlene on a search elsewhere, while he returned to the spot, made a strike and covered the spot with debris and brush and made plans to leave the district to get separated from his partner and the district.

"The rich ore for himself to dig out the spot numerous times before the district was left behind. Everything worked out as planned except the return to the district. When he finally returned, growth of trees and brush had so changed the topography of the country that he never found the old trail, although he did find some dead trees that he recognized as some he had burned down while on one of his visits to his claim."

No valuable ore ever has been developed in the district in which Cook claims to have found his lead. All the developed mines are much farther up in the mountains.
