The Cottage Grove high school football team will open the 1933 season Saturday, when they will travel to Reedsport to tackle the strong eleven there. The Cottage Grove team has one of the hardest schedules of any team in the county this season with six games scheduled for consecutive week ends and only one open date, October 27.

Fourteen letters were on hand when Coach Orlo Bagley called the first practice a week before school started. Five of last year's squad were lost by graduation. They are Lester Powers, Clyde and Warren Smith, Dalton Ward and Paul Sanders. Those from last year's squad who have returned are Ray and Floyd Thies, Aura Cook, Alfred Allen, Clarence Baily, Tom Sprankle, Claude Miller, Paul Sullivan, Dan Kelly, Faye Steward and Harold Mackin.

About 20 other boys are working out and will make an attempt to break into the lineup. The most promising of these are Clifford Shaw, Elmer Mason, Joe Sorenson and Vernon Thoreson.
