Ida's favorite recipe:
Rice Piedmonte
1 cup rice uncooked, 1 onion, 2 tablespoons olive oil, 4 or 5 cups soup stock, 1 cup mushrooms, 1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese, 3 tablespoons tomato sauce, salt and pepper. Heat oil in frying pan, brown onion slightly in it and add rice. Fry to a golden brown, then add broth a little at a time, stirring constantly. Add mushrooms and cook until tender. Just before removing from fire add tomato sauce, seasonings and cheese. Sprinkle with additional cheese. Serves six to eight.
