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LIQUOR CAUSES WORRY.
With the certainty of repeal of prohibition this year, way in advance of the time predicted a year ago by the most optimistic wets, both wets and dries are beginning to worry about how the hard liquor business is going to be managed.

The Sentinel does not expect an entirely satisfactory solution to be evolved, and it is going to be a problem to prevent return to something resembling the old-time saloon, which no one wants.

There are high license advocates and low license advocates, and sound arguments against both methods.

There are advocates for making liquor difficult to obtain and advocates for making it easy to obtain, and sound arguments against both methods.

There are those who believe, or profess to believe, that with prohibition repealed, liquor laws will be enforced as they never were under prohibition. That is hardly likely. Neither is it likely that the bars will be thrown down.

One of the novel ideas that has been suggested is to license the drinker and purchaser of liquor instead of the distributor. That is not a new idea. This writer heard it advanced about 30 years ago. That is an idea that would be splendid if it worked in practice like it does in theory, but it wouldn't be likely to work at all.

Imagine having to carry a license around as you have to have a license to buy a drink of liquor. A person's license would all ways be in the other coat and it would be a crime to give a drink to a person who couldn't produce a license.

Here's a suggestion that isn't likely to be adopted, but would solve the problem: Require every person intending to make a purchase of liquor, or take a drink of liquor, to publish a notice to that effect for three weeks in advance in the newspaper of general circulation nearest his place of residence.

Garden Club

Some Hints for November.
Now is a good time to move herbaceous shrubbery, small trees and broadleaf evergreens. All general landscaping can be done as long as weather permits.

Do not plant Japanese iris after the middle of the month. Dig all gladioli corms by the first of the month and take a chance and make the first planting for your next year's bloom in some sheltered place. Pack your bulbs in single layers in an upright position in a container with air circulation. If tiny sprouts that start in the spring end before planting time; then when the bulb is set in the ground the tip is pointed in almost any direction and the result is crooked, twisted stalks instead of the straight ones we desire.

This is the best month to plant roses. There are so many lovely varieties to choose from. Let's dig out some unsatisfactory bush and plant one of the new ones and add new pleasure to our garden.

It isn't too late yet to plant a few bulbs in pots for our window garden. Tulips, hyacinths, crocus, narcissus are all good and of course there are many others. Pot them, water well and store in a cool dark place.

There is something in the autumn that is native to my blood—Touch of manner, hint of mood; With the yellow and the purple and the crimson keeping time. The scarlet of the maples can shake me like a cry of bugles.
