Helping the World

All should strive earnestly that in their reading and observation the rejection of the false pictures presented may be complete and the emphatic acceptance of what is constant and good may help to light a beacon of good for the world.

In proportion as the thoughts to which he gives utterance are statements of the truths are "Nay, nay," to all that would oppose itself to the supremacy of God, good, in world affairs, and "Yea, yea," to every vital and constructive idea that seeks for expression in the thoughts of men, every individual may align himself with this divine power, applying it in his own thinking, and thus assist in world betterment.

Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, gives this loving counsel to all in her textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" (p. 281): "Hold thought steadfastly to the enduring, the good, and the true, and you will bring these into your experience proportionably to their occupancy of your thoughts." In this effective way we can rout the error of impotence, this enemy to our God-given right of conscious dominion and universal helpfulness. As masters of our thinking we can realize that every pure and honest thought goes out to bless and heal mankind, and that it can never be lost, for it is held in the infinitude of good. We can consider anew Paul's admonition to the Philippians: "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report, if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things."—*The Christian Science Monitor.*
