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Roadside Stands Sell Many Foods

Customers Are Attracted by Quality of Articles and Prices.

By Prof. W. C. Hooper, New York State College of Agriculture—WHL Service. Almost any sort of farm produce which is used for food can be sold at the wayside market. Fruit is well adapted to roadside selling.

Prices should also vary with the grade. It is always desirable to separate produce into different grades, for there are buyers for each quality. Prices may be set according to the prices in the nearest city, with due allowance for distance buyers must come, the grade of produce and the size of the container.

Tree Windbreak Saves Soil Blowing Damage. Severe damage to farm lands by strong winds that sweep great quantities of valuable top soil from fields may be materially reduced by planting windbreaks of trees, or by early spring or fall listing.

The Flock in Summer.
