Schools Get \$27,000.
County schools have this week received nearly \$27,000 from the county school fund and elementary school fund. The county superintendent distributed \$17,206 in the county school fund and \$9,692.50 in the elementary school fund, making a total of \$26,898.50. The amount apportioned in the county school fund was figured at the rate of \$1.11 per census pupil and in the elementary fund it was sent at the rate of \$2.90 per teacher.

County Treasurer Grace Schiska Friday sent \$3290.43 as special tax to the Cottage Grove and Junction City school districts.
