Subscription Rate Goes Up

Costs of producing a paper continue to increase. Wages everywhere have gone up, with the result that there has been a recent advance in the price of print paper. The cost of type metal is up, insurance rates are up, rent has advanced and practically everything that goes into making a paper is higher than it has been for several years.

The inevitable result is an advance in subscription price, but the advance decided upon at this time will be a moderate one, only 25 cents the year, making the rate \$1.75, which is the rate that prevailed a year ago. This rate will become effective February 1.
