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UNCLE SAM'S BILLIONS

When we think of the billions the government is spending, we usually think of the vast debts being piled up to be paid by taxation, but in that we are somewhat in error.

Large amounts have already been provided through additional taxes that are collected and thrown back into circulation. Some of the programs are self-financing. The money put into circulation by a number of the alphabetical organizations is merely loaned, and practically all of this will be returned. In fact, much of it already is being repaid at the rate of millions of dollars a day.

Huge loans have been made to banks, railways and other industries. These are to be returned with interest, are being returned.

Under the PWA a large proportion is to be repaid.

Loans under the home owners loan corporation are to be repaid with sufficient interest to cover expenses of conducting the business.

Billions being put into circulation are merely extension of credit on what is believed to be adequate security.

CWA money is a direct gift and is not to be returned. That is the reason the CWA program got into motion almost overnight. But CWA money goes into public work that would have been done some day with city funds, school district funds, county funds or state funds. Taxing bodies will be relieved of making the improvements that have been paid for with CWA money, so that this money has been far from wasted.

A good illustration of saving in local taxation by expenditure of CWA money is found in improvements made to Cottage Grove's water system. These improvements would have been made many years ago except that the city did not have the money. Because it did not have the money, it has been saved the expense entirely. For years members of the city council have been wondering how long the trunk line that carries the water from the mountains would continue to carry that water. The decision was made many years ago not to disturb the water line so long as it remained a usable hole in the ground lined with wood that remained of sufficient strength to keep the hole in shape. That it might be necessary to ask another bond issue to rebuild a portion of the line has been feared for many years.

About 15 years ago the city was in a similar fix. Its intake in the national forest had to be moved and two miles of pipe laid. The city didn't have the money, so the federal government, which was to get the money from the sale of federal timber, was asked to build the line. It agreed to do so, and the line was extended without expense to the city.

This makes twice the federal government has stepped in to save expense to Cottage Grove. We'd better keep on the good side of Uncle Sam, for we may need other expenditures in future years.

What seems an odd thing about republican support of the NRA program is that, if Franklin Delano Roosevelt had told in his campaign speeches exactly the program he would attempt to follow, most of us republicans would have trothed at the mouth and said he was crazy with the heat. We would have painted dark pictures of what would happen to the country if it were given to the democrats to despair. We would have said even worse than that and it is fortunate that F. How President Roosevelt dared to believe that they would be big enough and broad enough to give him the help that would keep him from plunging the country into utter darkness puzzles us.

Anyway the success of the program so far has given us the determination to see the president all the way. We recognize him to be a man of ideas, of indomitable perseverance, sincere, non-political as far as the immediate welfare of the nation is concerned.

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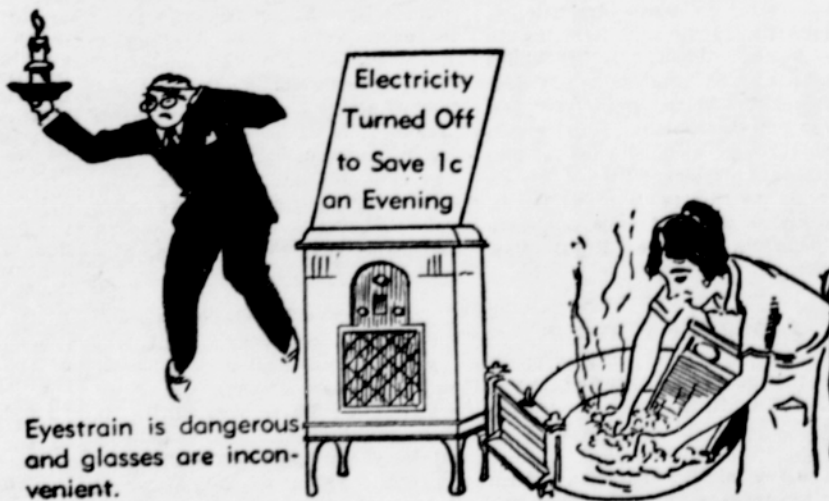
