This writer thought of the day when he met Hal on the tennis courts at Beason following an editorial convention and of the pleasant of the social evening that followed at the cabin where the grumbling of the ceaseless waves was audible.

This writer thought of the day at Coquille when he presented Hal with a silver loving cup for his prowess on the golf links, also following an editorial convention.

This writer thought of Hal at Hal's Half Acre at Taft, where Hal loved to play.

This writer thought of Hal as he delivered a talk at Roseburg and got a big laugh when he spelled a word that he was not certain he was pronouncing correctly.

This writer remembered Hal as he presided at the state editorial association's first gridiron banquet.

This writer thought of Hal as he visited in the Euri's home and showed the children several inter-

esting tricks by which they still remember him.

This writer thought of Hal at conventions, in the newspaper office, in the home, at the seashore, and, as he pondered, this writer could not think of a place where Hal did not fit. His genuine friendliness—if he had a dislike for anyone—we do not remember of his having ever referred to it—his wholesome, spontaneous humor, his fund of information upon many subjects, his likeable personality which he did not knowingly intrude upon anyone, his buoyancy of spirit, made him fit anywhere, made him welcome everywhere.

Hal will go down in history as one of the best secretaries of state Oregon had ever had, but his memory will be cherished in the hearts of legions of friends for qualities far above those required of a public official.

We do not know what is beyond, but if there is a life hereafter in which we shall again know those that we knew here, in which we shall again be with those who have gone before as we were to them here, we feel certain that Hal will have everything pleasantly arranged to welcome those he knew and loved here.

Hal left us while hardly at the zenith of his physical life, but to this writer he will ever be "good old Hal."

The eternal hand has written "30" for Hal, and we reluctantly accept the judgment, but we shall live in the hope that on the other shore we may see and know him again. Until then, friend Hal, until then, farewell!

DRUNKEN DRIVERS.

The comeback staged by John Barleycorn is said to have increased the number of drunken drivers, if that were possible. This newspaper has no sympathy whatever for the fellow who tanks up on intoxicating liquor, legal or otherwise, and then gets behind a steering wheel. Personal liberty does not give anyone the right to operate a car unless he is fully capable of giving full consideration to the rights of others, and certainly one of the rights we all enjoy is the one not to be run down and maimed or killed by a motor vehicle.

The courts and juries are having considerable trouble in deciding cases in which a person is charged with drunken driving. By the time a person who has been in an accident for which he may have been responsible is apprehended by police officers, he has been sufficiently sobered so that there is difficulty in proving that there was under the influence of liquor.

Some way out of the dilemma is sought.

We have it.

Here it is: It shall be an offense not less than a felony for a person having had one drink of whisky or three drinks of beer to operate a motor vehicle unless he has given legal notice of his intention to do so by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the territory in which he intends to operate such vehicle, such notice to occupy space equivalent to half a page of a newspaper composed of pages of six columns of at least 18½ inches in depth.

Unless the person operating a vehicle, after he has taken one drink of whisky or three drinks of beer, has an affidavit of publication from the newspaper in which the required notice has been published, he shall be deemed guilty without trial.

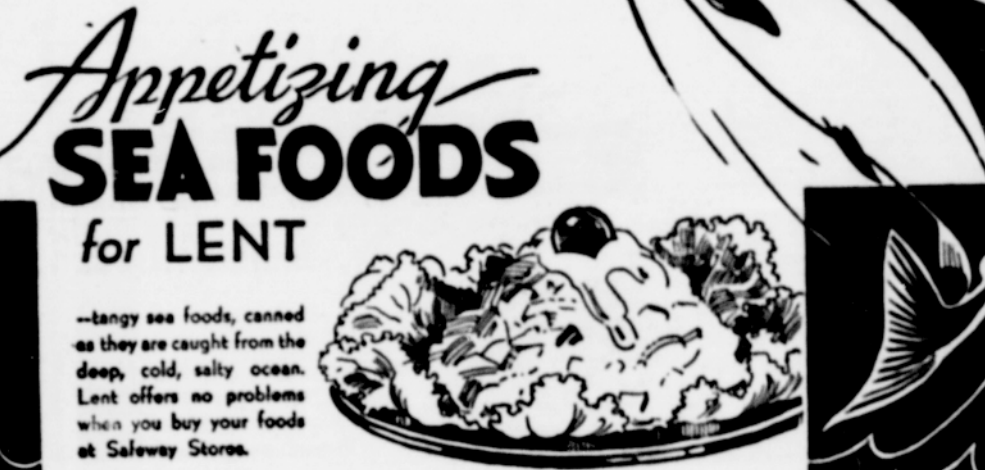
