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UNPROTECTED OREGON.

Astoria is continuing the battle for the establishment of a naval base at Tongue Point. While this would be of considerable benefit to Astoria, and financial benefits to other parts of the state would be small, the proposal for the establishment of such a base is by no means a local affair.

Literature presenting the argument for such a base shows an array of naval establishments and military posts in California and Washington, while Oregon has no naval base and only one army post. A thousand miles of coastline between San Francisco and Puget sound is unprotected.

There is no more widely known or more important river on the coast than the Columbia, yet it is left vulnerable to attack by a naval enemy, while along the Oregon coast there are several ports that might be entered by small enemy warships.

With this great unprotected coast, Oregon would certainly be selected for landing by any enemy which might approach from the Pacific. Oregon would be in much the same position that Belgium was during the world war.

A naval base at Tongue point might not be sufficient for protection of the entire coast, but this is the first move in getting adequate protection.

Astoria invested \$100,000 in securing the site upon the assurance that the base would be established and the government should keep faith with that city.

OLD AGE PENSIONS.

Old age pensions have brought cheer into many homes, but they also have brought the most contention of any governmental function in recent years.

Some of those who were not given pensions point out that many who did get them are not as much entitled to them as some to whom they were refused.

Some of those who receive \$5 a month find those in the \$7 list not so much entitled to the increased amount as some in the \$5 list. Some of those in the \$7 list think they should be in the \$10 list, some of those in the \$10 list think they should be in the \$15 list, some of those in the \$15 list think they should be in the \$20 list. Nearly all expected larger amounts.

Probably some errors have been made. Possibly some of these are because applicants did not make the proper showing. Possibly some are due to errors of judgment on the part of the pension board. In either case a job on the pension board is about as pleasant a one as being a Chinese emperor of a province controlled by the Japs. We're almost pleased that our candidates for county judge and county commissioner did not make the grade. We wouldn't have wished the pension board job onto them.

INSULL AND DILLINGER.

Samuel Insull is likely to have to return to the United States to stand trial for his crimes. With money misused from innocent investors he has been able to live in luxury and even had sufficient to charter a ship in which he nearly escaped and in which he was permitted to leave Greece. Meanwhile many of those who furnished the money have been depriving themselves of the necessities of life.

Dillinger, public enemy No. 1, has nothing about him to be admired, but to our way of thinking he is just as respectable as the once powerful utilities magnate, Insull, who probably wouldn't have the nerve to use a dummy pistol with which to make an escape.

Dillinger might take life in an effort to hold or regain freedom, but it is probable that the sorrow Insull has brought into many homes has caused as much suffering as anything Dillinger has done or is likely to do.

Insull probably won't approve of this comparison but he doesn't

seem in any haste to return to file objections.

Welsh Rarebit

1 tablespoon butter ½ teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon cornstarch ¼ teaspoon mustard
½ cup thin cream Few grains cayenne
½ lb. American cheese Toast or crackers

Melt butter in top of double boiler; add cornstarch and stir until well mixed. Add cream gradually, stirring constantly. Cook 2 minutes. Add grated or cut cheese and stir until cheese is melted. Season and serve on bread toasted on one side, pouring mixture on the untoasted side. Success of rarebit depends upon quality of cheese and the cooking. It should be smooth and of a creamy consistency, never stringy. Serve hot. Serves 4.
