UNFAIR LEGISLATION.

The most effective cudgel ever used by organized labor has been its publicizing of an industry or business as unfair to union labor. Employers may be compelled to use something similar to prevent organized labor from hamstringing business and industry, if the Wagner bill now in congress is a sample of the kind of legislation we may expect to be proposed at the behest of organized labor.

This statement is made by one who is friendly to organized labor and believes in organization of employees for their own benefit and protection, but the Wagner bill is so one-sided that by no stretch of the imagination can it be called anything except an attempt to make the American Federation of Labor an arbitrary dictator over all persons or firms employing more than one person.

Those who early expressed the fear that the NIRA would be used as a vehicle for putting organized labor in the saddle may have had some grounds for their fears, but it is the opinion of this writer that if the Wagner bill should become law, and an attempt should be made to enforce it, business and industry would be forced to a condition far more deplorable than that which preceded NIRA, therefore it does not seem possible that the administration would permit such a bill to become law.

Labor unions have done untold good in raising wages and bettering working and living standards of the wage earner of the country, but powerful as they have been they were never able to do more than demand under NIRA. Within a brief period sweatshop conditions have been removed forever and minimum wages established for every business and industry of the country. NIRA is doing for the worker more than labor unions could hope to do, and for the American Federation of Labor to now demand such dictatorial powers over industry and business as would demoralize business of the country and again throw millions of men out of work would be not only foolish but would put the American Federation of Labor on record as undoing everything for which it has striven since its organization. Its position would be greatly weakened and it is doubtful whether it could ever regain the high position which it now holds in the regard of not only the wage earner but of those employers who wish to be fair to labor.

This writer would wish to be either an employer or an employee with the Wagner bill enforced as a law of the land.

REPEAL IN PROSPECT.

The battle for liquor repeal already has started. In a folder giving publicity to protest meetings to be held Sunday and Monday in Portland the following statement is made: "To the West Politicians of the State of Oregon: 'You promised the citizens of our state that if they voted on the state enforcement dry law, you would see that the saloon did not come back. In the few short months since that time you have covered our great state with beer parlors—which have proved to be saloons under another name. 'At the first opportunity we shall hold you responsible at the ballot box, for you have been weighed in the balances and found wanting.'"

Dean U. G. Dubach, clean up standing, beloved dean of men at Oregon State college, is to be the principal speaker. So far as this writer knows, Dean Dubach has never been what is generally spoken of as a radical prohibitionist, but he believes booze is undermining the health and morals of the youth of the nation.

Bishop Titus Lowe, always an enemy of booze, but not generally thought of as a radical thinker, will be the other principal speaker. Such men as these wield a tremendous influence, and a battle started by them would be one to go down in history.

In the same folder already quoted the following statement is also made: "In Washington, D. C., the federal capital, the evening paper reports candy filled with rum, cognac, whiskey and sherry wine being sold to school children at two cents a piece. It says, 'the content is 14 per cent alcohol, six are stiff drink.' Rum flavored candy is already being sold in Portland."

Here is what is purported to be a statement from a sheriff: "I have seen more drunks in one night since repeal than in 10 or 12 years under prohibition. A man driving under the influence of liquor is a potential murderer. Regardless of what our opinion may be as to liquor there is not the slightest excuse whatever for a person appearing in a public place in a drunken condition. There is no excuse for his getting drunk anywhere else, but if he keeps out of our sight and doesn't interfere with us, we're willing to let that pass as his own business."

So long as manufacture and sale of liquor are legal, we have no word of exhortation for the person who manufactures or sells it to adult persons mentally competent, but not even the manufacturer and seller of liquor will claim that overindulgence is good for anyone.

Not even the manufacturer and seller of liquor will claim that a person is any better mentally, physically, or any other way, or enjoys life to any greater appreciable extent because of having an appetite for liquor, while such an appetite may do him irreparable injury. If the two preceding statements be true, then the person who induces overindulgence in liquor or attempts to create an appetite for liquor is in a reprehensible business.

These reprehensible practices, and overindulgence in public places, making drinking a nuisance to others, are furnishing powder for the guns of those who have already started the battle for a return to prohibition.

Judge B. L. Eddy, appointed by Governor Meier to fill the position left vacant by the death of Judge Hamilton, is a candidate for election to one of the three places on the circuit bench in this district. This writer has known Judge Eddy for many years. He is a man whose qualifications are such that there seems no reason why we should change the habit of reelecting those filling judicial positions. Judge Eddy served long in the state legislature, where he was recognized as an able floor leader who did his own thinking. Even those who disagreed with him acknowledged that he was incorruptible.

The editor of The Sentinel has a fairly fat folder of letters and newspaper clippings saying only kind things about his contemplated candidacy for secretary of state. That is one of the rewards of not actually becoming a candidate, the brickbats are not hurled.
