The dogwood is the shrub chosen for April.

The ancient Latin name for dogwood is Cornus, because of the toughness of the wood, was derived from the word cornu, meaning horn. The common name, dogwood, arose from the fact that in olden times a decoction of bark from Cornus sanguinea was used in England to wash many dogs.

The dogwood in variety is native in the temperate regions of the northern hemisphere and one variety is found in Peru. It is coming to be more and more appreciated for the beauty and variety of its berries, blossoms and handsome foliage.

Virginia has adopted the flowering dogwood for its state flower.

Dogwood is also to be commended for its ease of culture. It grows as well in shady places as in sunny, exposed situations and thrives in almost any kind of soil.

According to Bailey's various species of dogwood have many interesting uses. The flowering dogwood furnishes a useful substitute for quinine. Chewing these twigs has been known to ward off fevers.

The powdered bark and fresh twigs make good tooth powder. The bark mixed with sulphate of iron makes good black ink. The bark of the roots yields scarlet dye. The wood, being hard and close-grained, is good for tool handles. In the naturalistic and woodland planting or in the informal border the dogwood planted in drifts has great landscape value.
