In the assembly held Friday Jack Kelly was nominated from the floor for president, and Philip Glass for treasurer.

The following amendment to the constitution was recommended to the student body by the student council: The student body organization shall receive from all organizations within the student body other than the classes, freshmen, sophomores, juniors, seniors, not more than 10 per cent of net receipts from any entertainment given for profits by these organizations.

William Jones of the faculty of Willamette university spoke on fraudulent stocks and bonds in the assembly Thursday.
