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HISTORICAL PAGEANT IS TO BE PRESENTED

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Coming of Jason Lee to Oregon Country Is to Be Picturized Sunday.

The coming of Jason Lee to the Oregon country in 1834 will be observed at the Methodist church Sunday as a part of a celebration of this event throughout the country, particularly in Oregon.

At the forenoon service Rev. Groves will speak on Jason Lee and at 7:30 the historical and religious pageant, "The Light on the Trail," will be presented by a cast of 30 characters.

The pageant seeks to picture the search of the Indians of the Northwest for the white man's Rock of Heaven, with the response of Jason Lee and the church to the call.
