Storks' Migration Urge

Found to Be Inherited

Experiments recently tried with storks by the bird observatory at Rossitten, East Prussia, have apparently solved the mystery of their migration. Ornithologists had been divided between whether the phenomenon is an atavistic or an imitative trait. The results of the experiments favor the inherited urge as a solution, says a writer in the New York Times.

Supplementary to the experiments to solve the still unsolved problem as to why storks liberated east of the Danube sought Africa for the winter via the Balkans and why those liberated west of the river flew southwest, 150 young storks hatched in East Prussia were sent across to Essen by train, and liberated there a long time after the normal date for the winter flight to the south. Each was marked with a ring.

The first problem which the ornithologists set themselves was to establish the route taken. It was found that those which seek out the western district fly south over Spain and Gibraltar, while storks from the eastern provinces prefer a south-eastern route by way of Istanbul. The ultimate destination of both groups is Central Africa.

Would the young storks from East Prussia do as their parents had done, and make for Istanbul, or would they, once they found themselves in the territory of the western group, follow the latter's practice? There were two schools of thought among scientists.

The reports of bird watchers who had been specially notified show that the inherited urge is a stronger factor than the local circumstances of wind or weather which dictated the direction taken by the western stork family.

Exhibit Recalls Porcelain Find

At Meissen, Germany, a permanent porcelain exhibition has been created in the Albrechtsburg in which Johann Bottger, trying to produce gold for King August the Strong, stumbled on to the secret of making porcelain. In one small banquet room a table is set with the famous coral-red porcelain with the dragon mark, which was manufactured exclusively for the Saxon royal house until the end of 1918. "Bottger room" has a painting showing the inventor at his labors, and a showcase contains the materials used in making porcelain.

Meteor and Meteorite

A meteor is "a sudden luminous phenomenon, as of a star or bright body in rapid motion through the air, produced by a small mass of matter from the celestial spaces striking the air with planetary velocity, and suffering heating, dissociation, or combustion." A meteorite is "a fallen meteor; a mass of stone or iron that has fallen upon the earth from space." In other words, says Literary Digest, a meteor remains a meteor unless it falls upon the earth; in which case it is called a meteorite.

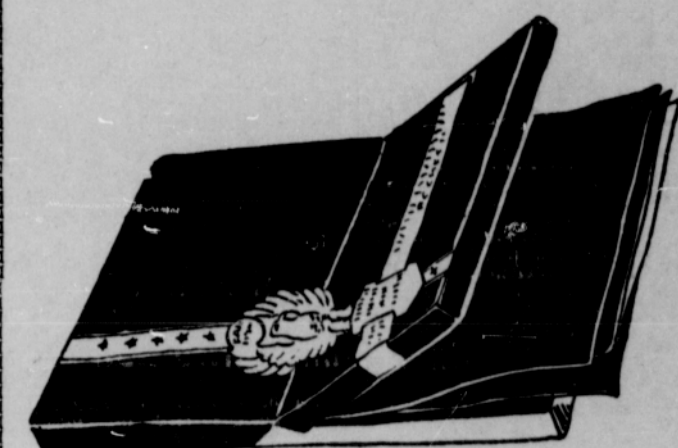
