On C. Mote, entomologist at Oregon State college, will be the principal speaker. He will give the life history of the little pest, tell all about its habits and the kind of citizen it is, also methods for eradication.

County Agent O. S. Fletcher will accompany Mr. Mote and the two will probably arrive early enough in the day to make a search of various premises to see whether

the parasite fly is on the job. A colony of 2,000 parasitized earwigs was released here two years ago and the flies should have greatly increased by this time.

Plans for an earwig poisoning creek will be made at this meeting.
