BETTER DAIRY PRICES WITHOUT NEW EXPENSE

Lane County Dairy Improvement Campaign Started Here Tuesday.

Producers of dairy products may increase consumption and get better prices for their products without adding to equipment or going to any great expense, dairymen were told at a meeting here Tuesday night which was the first of 17 such meetings to be held in the county. Similar meetings are being held all over the state and over several states as part of a national program for improvement of the condition of the dairyman. The local meeting was sponsored by the chamber of commerce as part of its program for aid to the producer.

E. H. Christensen of a Eugene dairy store spoke from the manufacturing standpoint and told how products must be delivered if a wholesome and sanitary manufactured product is to result.

Noel Gross, laboratory technician at O. S. C., conducted several tests which showed the reason for acid condition of milk and cream and showed the sediment content of buttermilk and cream.

County Agent Fletcher spoke on care of dairy products and sanitation in production.

It was pointed out by the speakers that a superior product will over a ready market at better prices. Through the program for improving the condition of the Oregon dairyman this state is now furnishing the U. S. navy with part of the butter formerly purchased in New Zealand.

The Cottage Grove creamery provided ice cream and a social session followed the business meeting.

G. A. Harnden, chairman of the Lane County Dairy Improvement association, presided.
