TAX PAYING RUSH IS ON

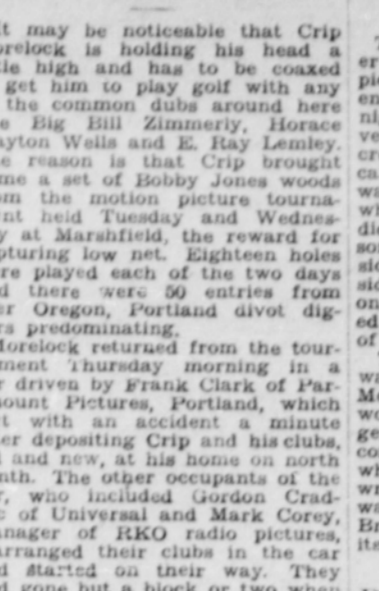
Third quarter 1934 taxes will be delinquent after Saturday, and there is a rush for payments at the tax collector's office.

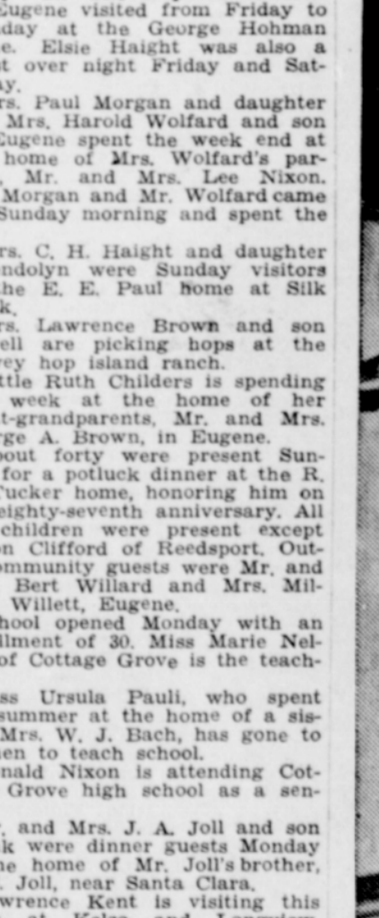
