SCHOOL DEBTS IN LANE ARE GREATLY REDUCED

Warrant and bonded indebtedness of school districts in Lane county were greatly reduced during the fiscal year June 30, 1933, to June 30, 1934, and the total cash on hand at the end of the year showed a big increase, according to an analysis of the audit of the books of all school districts in the county.

In Cottage Grove the warrant debt was \$13,711.39 this year and \$17,133.61 last year, while the bonded debt was reduced from \$34,500 to \$31,500. Cash on hand this year amounted to \$731.89 as compared to \$416.11 in 1933.

Patten Asks Rehearing.

Rehearing before the state industrial accident commission is asked by Ray Patten of this city in a circuit court suit filed Tuesday.

Patten claims to have sustained a severe pelvic injury March 13 while working for Tom Patten, the commission granted him temporary total disability for four months and 17 days, the amount totaling \$218.93, but he asks compensation for permanent total disability.

Allen Home Is Destroyed.

A fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the home of "Missouri" Allen Jr. on North Douglas street at 2:30 Thursday morning. The fire department was called, but too late to do anything but control the flames after the house and furniture had been destroyed.

Slashing Fire at London.

London, Ore. (Sept. 29.—Special.)—Slashing and stump fires broke out on the Joe Abeene, J. E. Banton and Vern Shortridge farms last week. No damage was done but it took hard work to get them under control. The flames got almost to the granary on the Shortridge farm.

Lee Land Wins Radio.

Lee Land of Creswell won the radio given away Saturday night by the Twin Oaks Lumber company. The prize was awarded to the person guessing closest to the number of nails in a pile. Mr. Land guessed 213,300 and the correct number was 213,595.

The Head Hunters of Ohio

In view of the criminality of most of the early squatters on Ohio soil, and escaped criminals who would not stop on the frontier of Ohio but go to the savages and bring them back to murder and rob the legitimate settlers, General Wilkinson in 1792 issued orders that if any soldier deserted in the direction of the Indians, scouts were to pursue him and bring back his head. For such service the scouts received \$40. With the general's order was this grim comment: "One head lopped off in this way and set upon a pole on the parade might do lasting good in the way of deterring others."

Where Repentance Is Strong

The earliest recorded use of suffocating gases in military operations was at the siege of the cities of Plataea and Bellum in the war between the Athenians and the Spartans, about 431 B. C. Here sulphur was burned and the fumes were employed to harass the enemy.
