COUNTY JUDGE OPPOSES SUPER COUNTIES PLAN

County Judge Fisk has come out in opposition to the proposal to be presented to the incoming legislature to consolidate the 36 Oregon counties into eight counties. The judge points out that such a method would be cumbersome, would entail considerable initial expense and would greatly inconvenience those having business with county offices. The result would be about the same as if persons having business with Lane county had to go to Salem to transact it.

There would also be a big squabble to determine what city should be the county seat of each of the consolidated counties and enmities would be engendered that would continue for years.

BANK DEPOSITS HERE SHOW GAIN FOR YEAR

Bank deposits in Cottage Grove have shown a slight but substantial gain during the past year.

On June 30 demand deposits were \$268,553.74; October 17 they had increased to \$314,858.84, and a statement of the First National bank, published this week, shows a further gain to \$325,819.47.

Even more significant may be the gains in time deposits. They were \$215,966.32 in June, had reached \$229,966.11 in October and the latest report shows a further gain to \$239,070.51.

Total deposits in June were \$526,426.22 and have now reached \$594,825.55.

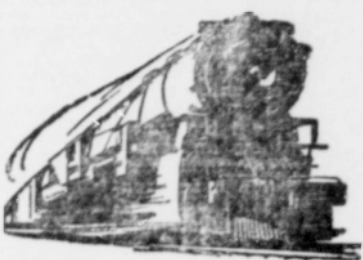
