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OLD AGE PENSIONS.

It is the easiest thing in the world to talk about old age pensions. There is an appeal about providing for those who have labored a lifetime and come to the shady portion of the road in danger of being without sufficient to keep themselves in decency.

A catch phrase that is, however, being overworked is the one that "no other group is more entitled to relief than those who have already created the wealth from which the money is derived." It is true that the great majority of those who have arrived at years which should entitle them to ease have done their part to create wealth from which come the profits taken by those of this generation, but it is equally true that many have been able to put away more than the wealth they created, while still others never did a day's work which they could avoid.

It would be ridiculous to provide anything for those who already have far more than enough for their needs and it would be ridiculous to provide luxury for those who never turned their hands over to do anything for themselves or for their country. However, underserving they may be, we can't permit them to starve or go without clothing, but certainly they are not entitled to have more than millions of middle age struggling daily to serve their country and provide for those near and dear to them.

Old age pensions have an appeal to all of us who soon shall be old. We do not know what our circumstances then may be. We want such pensions provided by the state, but we want them to be permanent. The Roosevelt proposal is not at all that we would ask, but at least the plan is a start and is such as to make permanent practically certain.

The Sentinel favors old age pensions and unemployment insurance and by the Roosevelt plan we would provide much better for the future than we have ever done before. If such a plan had become effective 25 years ago, the probabilities are that we should not know the depression of today.

We republicans can't help suggesting to the democrats that they set us a good example. We really need it.

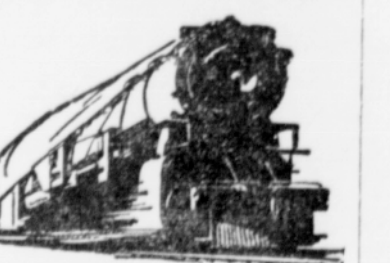
