PLANS ARE COMPLETED FOR PRESIDENT'S BALL

Local Committee Is Selected Without Regard to Political Affiliations.

Groups from every walk of life are organizing for the president's birthday party, to be staged Wednesday night of next week over the nation. In Cottage Grove the affair is in charge of a committee selected without regard to political or business affiliations, this committee divided into smaller committees for special duties.

Locally unnecessary expenses are being avoided in order that the net proceeds may be as large as possible. Seventy per cent of these will remain in the hands of a local committee, to be disbursed for the aid of infantile paralysis victims. The remaining 30 per cent will go to a national committee which will conduct research having for its object eradication of the dread disease from which the president once suffered.

The affair will be held in the armory, where an ample floor committee will guard against any boisterous conduct. A national program, with address by the president, will come in by radio.

W. S. A. Edlefsen Dies.

William S. A. Edlefsen, who until a few months ago was a resident of Lorane, died Friday evening in Portland just a few hours before his eighty-ninth birthday anniversary while visiting with a daughter, Mrs. Catherine Scott. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon in Eugene.

Mr. Edlefsen was a native of Hamburg, Germany, coming to the United States in 1867 and locating in Milwaukee, Wis. He was married there in 1869 to Miss Elise Dryer, also a native of Hamburg. He was in the florist business for 40 years. Mr. and Mrs. Edlefsen moved to Oregon in 1913 and made their home in the Lorane valley. Mr. Edlefsen is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Richard Ellmann of Milwaukee, Wis., and Mrs. Catherine Scott of Portland. Mrs. Elise Hamble of Portland is a granddaughter.
