JENSEN DEFEATS RYAN ROUGH-TUMBLE BOUT

Stage Too Small for Horseplay,
Biting and Fighting Mixed
With Wrestling.

Thor Jensen won from Pug Ryan at the armory Friday night in one of the fastest and most furious rough and tumble fights that Cottage Grove wrestling fans have witnessed. The event was crowded with horseplay but was a fast-moving exhibition of wrestling, biting and kicking which extended all over the armory. Harry Elliott, referee, was kept busy doing his share of the fighting.

Jensen won the first fall in 14 minutes with a body press which followed a furious attack of rabbit punches and blows to Ryan's head which left him so dazed that Jensen was forced to help him to his feet each time he knocked him down.

Ryan took the next fall with a Boston crab after he had severely beaten Jensen for 12 minutes with rabbit punches, thrown him over the ropes, jumped on him and kicked him.

After narrowly escaping another Boston crab, Jensen came back to win the third fall with a terrific body slam and a body press. Before Elliott had finished announcing Jensen as victor, Ryan charged into Elliott and the fans were given a short but furious referee-wrestler match which caused more excitement than the advertised portion of the card.

Max Lake, Springfield, won a clean, hard-fought match from Pud Swanson, Cottage Grove. Lake took the first fall in six minutes with a pinwheel roll and a short arm scissors. Swanson came back in the next period with head butts, leg splits, flying leg scissors and arm stretches, winning the fall with a series of arm whips and a body press. After winning the fall, however, Swanson was so exhausted that he crawled from the ring on hands and knees and, though he put up a game battle in the final canto, Lake had little difficulty in getting the winning fall with a surfboard and body scissors.

Bob Castel won a disappointing match from Sammy George with two straight falls on Boston crab holds.

Jimmy and Jerry Lake, 7 and 9, put on a substitute match.

Ag Program Started.

Programs of work for Lane county farm organizations and individual farmers for 1935 in co-operation with O. S. Fletcher, county agent, were adopted by the Lane County Agricultural council at a meeting held in Eugene Friday. These programs were in farm crops, horticulture, dairying, poultry, general livestock and rodent control, and were prepared by the project committees appointed by the council in cooperation with the county agent and specialists from Oregon State college.

A general program of work for agriculture committees of subordinate granges was adopted by Pomona grange Friday afternoon. The program includes work on marketing, farm record keeping, 4-H club work, rodent control, weed control, agricultural situation and outlook reports, livestock improvement, and agriculture programs at regular meetings of granges.

CARELESS MOTORISTS DRIVEN OFF HIGHWAYS

Justices of Peace More Inclined
to Impose Penalties and
Revoke Licenses.

Magistrates in Oregon last month "cracked down" hard on motorists who violated traffic regulations. They chalked up a total of 775 convictions. Through these convictions the secretary of state relieved 56 operators of their licenses to drive, removing 56 assertedly dangerous motorists from Oregon's streets and highways for a time at least. Of this number 10 were suspensions recommended by Oregon judges. The remainder were revoked by law because of the nature of the conviction.

During the first five days of January 14 licenses were revoked and one was suspended.

In Lane county during December eight convictions were reported, one by Justice Young of Cottage Grove, one by Recorder Bryson of Eugene and six by Justice Johnson of Eugene. Two operators' licenses were revoked and one was suspended.

As city, county and state officials swing into the 1935 phases of the "Let's Quit Killing" campaign, under the leadership of the Oregon State Motor association and other organizations, the shiftless motorist is finding himself more and more "on the spot." The growth in number of convictions has been taken as an indication that justices throughout the state are becoming increasingly aware of the hazard to life and limb created by careless and incompetent drivers.

Stolen Car, Moonshine Captured Here

A story of a girl friend loaning her brother's car for a trip from Portland to Cottage Grove was told by a woman member of a party of four who were apprehended here Tuesday with a stolen car and a half gallon of moonshine. There were two men and two women in the car, none married to any one of the others. The presence of the moonshine was explained by its alleged presence in the car when the car was borrowed from the sister of the man who owned it. Presumably the occupants of the car had not discovered the presence of the liquor.

The woman who claimed to have borrowed the car also claimed she brought the party here for the purpose of borrowing money from a relative, who is a well known resident on Coast fork. None of the four had any money.

State officer Koepke took the quartet to Eugene for return to Portland.
