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GIVE TOWNSEND A CHANCE.

Those in Washington who would have prevented a full and fair hearing on the Townsend old age plan acted unwisely and unfairly. Such action was unwisely because that method would bring added millions to support of the plan. Those millions would come from those who may not be sold on the plan, but believe in a square deal. Any such number of persons as those who are supporting Dr. Townsend and his plan, however fantastic millions may believe it to be, are entitled to a full and fair hearing.

If for no other reason, the Townsend plan is entitled to a hearing because it has brought attention as never before to the principle of old age pensions, and it is not likely that the Roosevelt plan would have been presented except for the force of numbers of Townsend supporters. Old age pensions have been advanced probably ten years or more by the almost overwhelming support the Townsend plan has drawn from persons in every walk of life who have grasped at it as a sure and permanent cure for depressions.

The Sentinel has pointed out what it believes are faults in the plan, but it wants every congressman to hear every word that can be said for it, as well as every word that can be said in opposition, before he casts his vote.

A PROPOSED RECALL.

The Lane county organization of Townsend clubs has started a recall move against Representative Howard Merriam, alleging that he promised to vote for a Townsend old age memorial to congress, then voted against the memorial.

The Sentinel has opposed every recall move started in Oregon that was not based upon crookedness in office. In such opposition it has given no consideration as to whether it supported the office holders in their campaigns for office.

The Sentinel opposed the election of Walter M. Pierce as governor, but vigorously opposed a proposed recall. The Sentinel vigorously opposed the election of Julius L. Meier, but it soon opposed a recall move against him.

There may be a question as to whether Merriam did or did not express himself favorably toward the Townsend memorial, but even could it be proved that he deceived supporters of the Townsend old age pension plan, the expense of removing him from office would not be justifiable. A Eugene paper has said such an action would require two elections. One should be sufficient, but that would cost a pretty penny and, even if Merriam were removed, this legislative session would have completed its labors and the person elected to succeed Merriam would never take his seat except in the event of a special session.

An election in Lane county could cost around \$30,000. That is a rather expensive price to pay for convicting a man of lying. It would keep election boards rather busy if recall moves should be started against every officeholder who has failed to remember his promises, and so much money would be distributed for election expenses that we should not need old age pensions to bring back prosperity.

CRITICISM OF SERA.

Some of the ways of SERA are mysterious.

SERA is a part of NRA. The hope of NRA is that industry shall soon be able to absorb idle workmen of the county, but SERA evidently purposes to operate to make more idle workmen.

Pioneer Footprints

Walling's history gives the following biographical sketches of pioneers of south Lane:

JOSEPH D. PETRIE.—Was born in the little town of Little Falls, Herkimer county, N. Y., November 18, 1822. He spent his early life in the towns of Little Falls and Herkimer, where he received a common school and academic education. Mr. Petrie was raised a farmer and has made farming his life work. It may truly be said that he is a self-made man, having received little or no assistance or control after the death of his father, which occurred when he was about 11 years old. He moved to Concord, Jefferson county, Wis., in September, 1843, and bought state land which was at that time a dense forest of heavy timber. Mr. Petrie did his full share of

That SERA is actually already competing with established industry is made certain by word from Roseburg protesting the establishment there of an SERA shoe repair shop. The field there already was amply filled by three repair shops which, by the action of SERA, are made less able to pay wages required by their code, less able to pay rent for their work shops, less able to reemploy idle shoe repairers.

If SERA shoe repair shops merely made repairs for those on relief rolls, there might be slight argument for them, but it seems such shops actually solicit business that was going to established shops that were paying NRA wages and living up to the code of fair competition provided for the industry. Evidently SERA needs some instructions about fair competition.

This kind of action on the part of SERA is going to lose a lot of support for NRA and will bring such criticism—justifiable criticism—that the whole network of NRA will fall. The Sentinel, for one, will lose all interest in a recovery program that does those things that make recovery of industry impossible, and is likely soon to be vigorously criticizing such a program.

Industry can't recover when taxed to support unfair competition by the government.

MUST BE AMERICAN.

The Sentinel admires the straightforward statement of the Lane county chairman of the Townsend old-age pension clubs that no one but an American citizen could receive the pension and that anyone who has lived here for years without endeavoring to become a citizen should be debarred from receiving the pension. The Sentinel would like to see the chairman go further and declare that those born here who have never performed the duties of citizenship should be barred. Many who come here make better citizens than many who were born here and probably never would have become citizens except by the accident of birth.

pioneer work incident to those days in that region; as he had little or nothing but his hands to begin with, he literally chopped his farm out of the wilderness and converted it into a comfortable home. He married Miss J. F. Holcomb, February 25, 1847. They have had eight children: Ellen L., Kossuth, Jost D. Jr., Ellery C., Ernest F., Gertrude A., Irving W., and Harley H. Jost D. Having for many years had a strong desire to secure a home in the Pacific coast he in 1882 sold his homestead in Wisconsin and removed to Siuslaw in this county, where he purchased 1,440 acres of excellent farming land where he now resides. Mr. Petrie is also the principal owner of the Siuslaw grist and saw mills, now in process of erection, to be propelled by the waters of the Siuslaw river.

HON. E. C. CHRISMAN.—Resides at Cottage Grove; has retired from business; was born in Lee county, W. Va.; came to state September 27, 1851, and to county in the spring of 1853; was first married April 2, 1835, to Pheba Flannery; was again married in June, 1854, to Lucinda McGill. Surviving children are Mary J., Peter G., Sarah A., Nelson P., Winfield S. and Gabriel R.

GEORGE C. MILLER.—Resides at Cottage Grove; is a blacksmith and wagon maker; was born in Creswell, Lane county, Oregon, November 16, 1857; not married; his father, David Miller, crossed the plains to Oregon in 1852.

OSCAR F. KNOX.—Resides at Cottage Grove; is a butcher; was born in Schuyler county, Mo.; came to state and county in 1853; was married in September, 1872, to Sarah L. Churchill. Children are: Mamie, Lottie J., Roy, Duke and Lizzie.
