LICENSES ARE TAKEN FROM MANY MOTORISTS

In a determined attempt to curb traffic violators and remove the most dangerous from the streets and highways of Oregon, judges throughout the state last month convicted 722 motorists, and the secretary of state suspended or revoked operators' licenses of 53.

In Lane county there were three convictions and one license suspension. Forty-one drivers in the state lost their operators' licenses. Most of the revocations were mandatory following convictions on charges of driving while intoxicated. Twelve licenses were suspended for reckless driving, failure to stop and speeding.

Out of all the cases handled in January by Oregon courts, eight of them involved drivers who had not renewed their old operators' license, and eight more of them involved drivers who had never been licensed in Oregon.

Houses to Rent Found At Premium Here

If lack of vacant houses is an indication of improvement in conditions, Cottage Grove should be in splendid condition, for every house in the city is reported to have occupants, including a number that did not have tenants for a year or longer periods. Those looking for suitable houses say there is no such thing.

City Is to Be Surveyed For P. O. Building

The chamber of commerce has received word that a survey of Cottage Grove has been ordered by the postoffice department for the purpose of learning whether the city shall get an appropriation for a postoffice building in case funds are allotted by congress that may be used for the purpose.
