in the annual report of the
American Telephone and Tele-
graph company.For 1934 total operating reve-
nues of the nation-wide system
were \$884,500,000 and total ex-
penses \$705,500,000. These expenses
included \$89,500,000 for taxes, an
average of \$6.76 for each telephone
in service. Earnings increased
over 1933, when they were \$5.38
on each \$100 share of stock, and
were \$5.96 for 1934.There are 875,000 stockholders,
of whom 379,000 are women and
