Funeral services for Albert E. Burrows, who died Monday in a Eugene hospital, were held this afternoon (Thursday) from Mills chapel, with Rev. I. G. Shaw of the Springfield Christian church officiating. Interment was in the A. F. & A. M.-I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mr. Burrows was born May 28, 1884, in Ord, Neb., and was aged 50 years. He was married to Miss Katie Finnerty December 26, 1907, in Albany. He had lived in Cottage Grove since 1903, with the exception of the past two years spent in Albany, where he was employed by the Southern Pacific company. He was a member of the Christian church and the Odd Fellows, Masonic and Neighbors of Woodcraft lodges. He is survived by his wife; two daughters, Miss Millicent Burrows, this city, and Miss Jerrine Burrows, Lebanon; his father, C. W. Burrows Drain.
