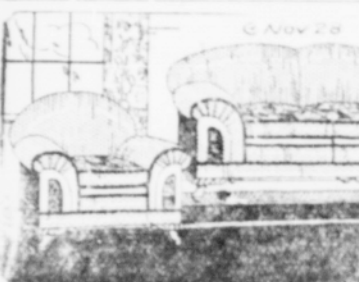

The neck is tied through metal eyelets with a red and white twisted cord in "middy" fashion—truly a formal of "youthful" touch.

The "Clark Gable" spring coats are fashioned somewhat after the men's plaid blousing styles with more of the smart tailored effect rather than a "manish" line. This coat is shown in the tweed-tone fabrics in both light and dark colors. Among the new coat-suits are new spring patterns in the "finger-tip" length.

One outstanding foundation garment has a two-way stretch back cut low to the waist line at the back and shoulder straps of latex, heat-proof elastic. The bandeau is of dainty lace with a lace net foundation of the up-lift type attached to the girdle. One new bandeau is a dainty lace number of uplift type supported by narrow "bather-neck" straps. The newest panties include the "brier" styles cut high at sides with hand front and elastic sides or narrow hand front and button sides.
