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TIMBER WORKERS JOIN A. F. L. ORGANIZATION

Organizers Come Here to Be-
rate Four-L and Operators
of Sawmills.

Organization here of a timber workers union, accomplished at a mass meeting held Friday, has caused fear among operators and business interests that employees of the lumber industry here may be asked to help pull chestnuts out of the fire when employees of the industry at other points are called out on strike. Operators have put forth no argument against organization of the workers in a local which they would themselves govern and in which they would handle only their own troubles, but operators see danger to employees, to operators and to business interests when the organization is one that might be asked to participate in a sympathetic strike in which they would have no direct interest. While a large number of employees here seem to favor the organization that has been effected, a number have the same fear as employees.

One hundred fifty signatures were secured by four organizers from the American Federation of Labor, who were here Thursday and Friday. At the mass meeting these organizers berated the Four-L and sawmill operators. Two or three employees took exception to some statements made and opposed organization.

Organization here came just as the strike was petering out in the Portland and Seattle areas, so that workers here won't be drawn into the present trouble.

Some of the workers here have expressed the opinion that mills are making no money at present. Others believe a demand should be made for higher wages. Operators claim to have been operating in the red for several years and declare they will be forced to close down should a demand for higher wages be made.

Temporary officers were elected as follows: Fred Stewart, chairman; Alvis Wicks, secretary; Joe McCargar, financial secretary.

Mills have continued to operate as usual during the past week with reduced crews. Two mills have gone into operation since the strike was called on the Columbia.

NO MONEY AUCTION IS DATED FOR JUNE 15

Merchants Furnish Prizes for
Which Auction Buck Hold-
ers Will Bid

Saturday of next week is the date of Cottage Grove's first "No Money" auction being sponsored by The Sentinel. Merchandise prizes are being furnished by business houses of the city and the only "money" that may be used in bidding for these will be Auction Bucks, which are given free by participating merchants, one buck for every 50-cent purchase.

Interest is rather keen in this new form of boosting home trade, those making purchases in the city are garnering their Auction Bucks and indications are that there will be spirited bidding. In similar events held elsewhere a sack of flour, for example, has gone for a thousand dollars in Auction Bucks. As the Auction Bucks have cost nothing, bidders have a lot of fun spending their "money."

The auction will be held at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon of next week in front of The Sentinel office on north Fifth street, permission having been secured from the city to rope off the street during the auction.

Carl Owens Is Robbed.

Carl Owens arrived Monday from his claims on Steamboat to report that he had been robbed by an employee, who left unceremoniously while Mr. Owens was away from his cabin for a few hours. The plunder taken included four guns and a knapsack of miscellaneous articles, a heavy load for a man to carry over mountain trails, but the thief was a large man and Mr. Owens believed he would be able to carry the load. It was believed the fellow took trails toward Oakridge.

City's Saving Is Less.

The saving the city is making in salaries by giving L. W. Colner the recorder's job in addition to the duties of city engineer and water superintendent, is \$75, instead of \$90 as stated in The Sentinel last week. Don Allen, appointed water collector, was given a \$25 increase in salary, instead of \$10 as stated last week, cutting the saving to \$75.

CACHED BAG OF GOLD IS FOUND

Old high grade days in the Bohemia district, during which many employees of the mines got away with small quantities of rich ore, were brought to mind a few days ago when a bag of ore that had been cached for years was found during repairs being made at the Champion preparatory to resumption of operations on a big scale.

Godard, who has charge of construction work, was tearing away a piece of tin that had been nailed to the outside of rafters of a roof when something heavy dropped out and struck him on the head. It was a bag containing \$20 or \$25 in ore and probably had been in its hiding place for a quarter or third of a century. FARMERS IN FAVOR WHEAT CONTROL

Lane county wheat growers voted strongly in favor of a wheat production control plan to follow the program that expires with the 1935 crop, according to unofficial returns released by O. S. Fletcher, secretary of the Lane County Wheat Production Control association.

In the referendum concluded on May 25, 179 contract signers voted yes and 67 voted no on the question "Are you in favor of a wheat production adjustment program to follow the present one, which expires with the 1935 crop year?" One non-signer voted no. In the Cottage community, 19 voted yes and 4 voted no.

INCH TOURNAMENT NEXT SUNDAY

MAY, 1935, IS DRIEST SINCE 1875

The driest month of May since 1890 and the driest May with one possible exception since 1875, has created a forest fire situation which every vacationist should bear in mind as he starts his recreation trip in the next few days or in June, according to the forest service. 'Added to the unusually dry condition of the forest,' say forest officials, 'spring vegetation, ordinarily serving as a valuable fire check at this time of year, has been delayed, owing to the cold earlier months, and the result is a fire hazard extraordinarily acute for this season.'

The Umpqua forest has had one fire already which covered approximately an acre in the Bohemia district. Two lookouts are on their stations in the south Umpqua district and more will be placed at key positions if dry conditions continue.

ALL STORES FAVOR HOME PRODUCTS

Referring to a letter which appeared in The Sentinel last week in which a producer said some way should be found to have all local products available handled by local stores, one store manager has made the statement that he believes all stores of the city favor such a plan. He believes, however, it should be up to the producer to let local stores know what he has and when he can deliver. Stores prefer home products but feel that they have to have products as their customers wish them and must know ahead of time that they will have the products they wish.

PRICE HAY IS UPPED THREE TIMES

Hay shipped from here costs almost exactly three times as much when delivered in the drought-stricken states as was paid for it here. S. C. Veatch recently loaded out two cars at Halsey, receiving \$8 the ton. As he was loading it he picked up a piece of paper on the floor of the car, wrote a note on it stating the price received here and asking the purchaser to write stating what price he paid. This he slipped under the wire of one bale. Within a week or two he received word that the hay cost \$23.75 delivered. Most of the increase was for freight and handling charges.

CITY IS ASKED FOR 5-CENT WATER

The Garden club has asked the city to give trial to water for irrigation at 5 cents the thousand gallons. It was pointed out in a petition to the council that a large number of lawns in the city have been permitted to go without watering because property owners feel that they can not pay the rate that has been in effect many years. Users of water would pay the present minimum of \$1.50 for 8,000 gallons and 5 cents the thousand for additional water. The council would fix a maximum amount that might be used at the 5-cent rate.
