**BLUE EAGLE LOSES FEATHERS.**  
 The United States supreme court, by a unanimous decision, has stripped the Blue Eagle down to its pin feathers. Although the emergency that gave birth to the Blue Eagle was great, the highest tribunal of the land decided without a dissenting vote, that no emergency is great enough to warrant setting aside the constitution.

The Sentinel had hoped that fixing of minimum wages and maximum hours might be found constitutional, but it was these features which the supreme court found unconstitutional. With wages and hours fixed, competition would be sufficiently regulated and every employer would be on an equal basis. Efficiency, initiative and aggressiveness would then be rewarded. With these features knocked into a cocked hat, there is danger that employers, wishing to undersell competitors, will endeavor to reduce wages and lengthen hours. When any employer does that, his competitors have to do likewise or get out of the game. That means that we may again hear of women working for a few pennies a day in eastern factories and men not treated much better.

The Sentinel is one of the many republican newspapers that gave unrestrained support to NRA. One reason it gave for doing so was that millions of persons believed that something of the sort would work and these persons would not be satisfied unless the plan were tried. Long before the supreme court decision there were symptoms that the NRA and its codes would have to be greatly revised. Old human nature had entered the picture and many found ways to evade the codes, while the government couldn't employ an army sufficient to catch all the chiselers. In fact, the government itself encouraged chiselers by buying their products.

Some will ask why the administration didn't get a supreme court decision before it launched NRA. The answer is that the supreme court doesn't pass upon the constitutionality of a proposed act. It can not give its opinion until the law has been enacted, and not then until a complaint has been brought before the court.

Scuttling of NRA has been welcomed by many who had honestly given their best to abide by the codes. There seems little doubt that NRA was putting many little fellows out of business. It also placed the government in the position of promoting and defending strikes such as those of the long-shoremen last year and the timber workers this year. Regardless of whether either strike was justifiable, the government should not be in the position of fathering and encouraging labor troubles.

NRA has gone, and now we can start from scratch again. A number of other planks of the New Deal probably will have to go before industry can settle down to bringing us out of the depression. The uncertainty of everything and fear of what may happen when the government lets go has industry jittery.

**PENSION PLAN OFFERED.**  
 To the Editor: Most of us favor old age pensions although opposing plans so far offered. I make no claim that my plan will provide more than adequate care for the aged, to which they are entitled, but it is an answer to those who claim nothing has been offered in place of the Townsend plan.

By some tax other than property tax, agreed upon by voters of the country, the federal government shall finance old age pensions for citizens of 60 years in an amount of not less than \$35 nor more than \$45 a month for single persons and not less than \$50 nor more than \$60 a month to a husband and wife, the age of husband being 60. Upon death of one or the other the survivor shall rate as a single person. A person having income from any source other than manual labor shall be eligible only to sufficient to give him income equal to the old age pension.

The old age pension shall not be compulsory, nor shall it be withheld upon the grounds of former penal servitude up to a term of (7) years, but conviction of a crime

after receipt of the pension shall forfeit the pension forever.

The amounts of pension shall be the same in all states, may be raised, but shall not be lowered under the minimum set by law. Raising or lowering shall be in the same ratio for single or married persons.

The president shall appoint a national old age pension inspector, to receive a suitable salary from pension funds. He shall oversee everything in connection with old age pensions over the nation and shall cooperate with pension officers to be appointed by the several states.

**Section II.** Each state shall furnish suitable and decent housing facilities for old age pensioners of that state, but living therein shall not be compulsory. These buildings shall be approved by the national inspector and shall be tax free and rent free to pensioners.

Pensioners shall have the privilege of retaining and occupying their own homes, which shall be tax free up to a certain assessed valuation as long as occupied by the pensioners. No such exemption shall apply to any other home where pensioners may wish to live. In case some person capable of paying the tax lives with a pensioner, the home shall not be exempt from taxation.

Pensioners shall be required to spend the full amount of their pensions within the United States.

**Section III.** Each state shall furnish free medical aid and hospitalization to pensioners, provided that a competent board shall decide when such is necessary.

**Section IV.** Each state shall provide a set amount for funeral expenses of pensioners.

**Section V.** By such means as the voters may elect the State of Oregon shall provide funds for housing and care of pensioners suitably and decently and such construction shall be by residents of the state. Wishes of pensioners for city or country shall be followed. Housing shall be tax free and rent free to pensioners, shall be held in the name of the state, pensioners to keep up minor repairs, the state to make major repairs. Suitable penalties shall be imposed upon those who wilfully destroy such property.

**Section VI.** The legal voters of the state shall select a state old age pension supervisor, to receive a suitable salary, who shall cooperate with the federal pension inspector and with county supervisors.

**Section VII.** Each county shall elect a county supervisor of pensions, to receive a suitable salary, who shall give reasonable service to pensioners, see that they receive proper care and guard them from the unscrupulous, but, except in rare cases, shall in no way supervise the manner in which pensions shall be spent.

We realize that some provision should be made for those between 50 and 60 who are physically unable to support themselves, as well as for pensioners' widows who have not reached pension age.

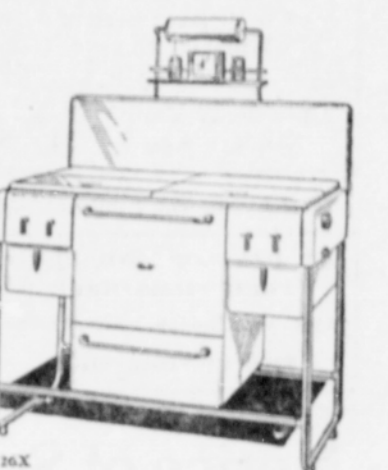

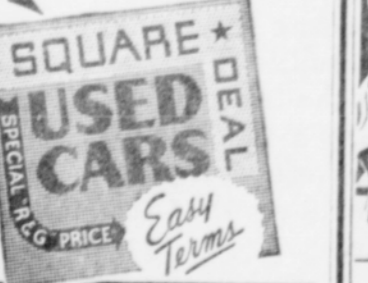
