

NEW DEAL POPULARITY IS ON WANE IN EAST

In the east there is very little support for the New Deal program, according to O. V. Breeze, former city recorder here, who arrived home last week from an eastern trip and left again Monday for Mason City, Ia., where he expects to be located for several months.

"Of about 150 persons questioned," Mr. Breeze said, "only two were 100 per cent for Roosevelt, while about 15 per cent were neutral and the others were opposed. A prominent banker made the statement that if the dollar could be stabilized, at what point would make little difference, the country would come out of the depression in a hurry."

Mr. Breeze said that in railroad yards in every big city were hundreds of locomotives on sidetracks with their cabs boarded up waiting for the revival of industry and there were, of course, many times as many idle freight cars.

Mr. Breeze will become associated with a brother in a large gasoline and mercantile business at Mason City and expects to establish a branch at Portland.

WHEAT GROWERS VOTE TO CONTINUE AAA

Wheat growers of the nation voted 85 per cent or approximately 6 to 1 in favor of continuance of the AAA wheat control program, according to official tabulations released from Washington. This is almost exactly the majority by which the plan carried in Oregon in the recent referendum.

With this overwhelming mandate from the growers the administration will offer new contracts in the near future, probably by July 1. George E. Farrell, chief of the wheat section has announced. These contracts are understood to run for four years with provisions for withdrawal earlier if desired.

The official tabulation of Oregon's vote made by the state college extension service shows that 5271 contract signers voted to continue the plan while 840 voted against it. Among wheat growers not now holding contracts 76 voted yes and 14 no.
