

## HOMEMAKERS TO HAVE ENTIRE WEEK OF REST

A homemakers' vacation camp for women of Lane county is being arranged by the home economics division of the extension service of O. S. C., according to O. S. Fletcher, county agent.

The camp will be held at Clewov lake, 1 1/2 miles south of Florence, from Tuesday, June 25, to Sunday, June 30.

The purpose of the camp is to provide a restful, inspiring and instructive vacation period at minimum cost. Any homemaker in Lane county, whether from city or country, is eligible. Registration can be made at the county agent's office not later than June 17.

Facilities make it necessary to limit the number who attend to 50. Twenty-one have already enrolled.

As a novelty no dishwashing, meal planning or cooking will be required of the campers.

The cost will be \$3 in cash and some produce from the home supply. Those campers who prefer not to bring produce will be charged \$4. Everyone will arrange her own transportation.
