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BICYCLING BOY KILLED.

A newspaper carrier boy at Eugene was killed a few days ago when his bicycle was struck by a car being driven at high speed. The district attorney could find no grounds sufficient for action against the driver of the death car. The circuit judge, when the district attorney refused to act, put his court machinery to work and an investigation was held, with the result that blame was placed upon the boy who was no longer here to tell his story.

The Sentinel does not attempt to place the blame, but it does call attention to the fact that bicycle-riding boys and girls in Cottage Grove are every day escaping death only through the efforts of motor car operators. Children every day on bicycles turn in the middle of blocks in the business section, ride on the wrong side of the street in the business section, cut corners on the wrong side of the street in front of oncoming cars, swing around corners and in front of cars without warning of any kind.

Some day a mangled boy or girl is going to be picked out of the wreckage of his or her bicycle and the coroner's jury is going to say that the girl or boy was at fault.

It is passing strange that parents, who can't help but know the careless ways of boy and girl bicyclists, permit their youngsters to ride their bicycles through traffic unnecessarily, and most of the bicycling in the business section is entirely unnecessary. Most of the children pedaling around the business section are merely out for joy rides.

Even if girls and boys on bicycles made any pretense to observe traffic regulations, which they do not, they have no business in congested district unless it is necessary for them to be there.

A good way to prevent tragedy is to keep children away from where tragedies are likely to happen.

ADULTS DON'T REMEMBER EITHER.

We hear a great deal about how little our kids learn at school and how little a high school graduate remembers of what he was taught in the grades. Generally speaking there is some ground for this complaint, although some students have astounded us by their display of knowledge. On the other hand many pupils complain that they couldn't learn anything from this teacher or that teacher. Such pupils have the wrong slant on how to get education. Education isn't gotten so much from teachers as from efforts of pupils themselves, a fact which is proved by the knowledge of men who have had little schooling.

All this is by way of leading up to saying that we who are about to pass out of the picture haven't much to brag about. How many of us are making use of what we were taught in school? How many even remember any great amount of what we were taught?

A test would show as appalling the number of adults who can not work simple problems in arithmetic. Such comparatively simple things as percentage and equation would stump probably more than half the adults. This writer believes the proportion would run much higher than that.

Of one thing this writer is certain and that is that 75 per cent of adults can not write a letter that would pass an eighth grade examination. The percentage probably runs even much higher than that. Stenographers who know how to use English save the situation for a large number of successful business men and captains of industry.

A person who edits copy submitted to a newspaper knows something about the atrocious English that is used by the general run of persons. In that general run are included business men, heads of industries, preachers, lawyers, high school graduates, college graduates and sometimes even school teachers. If there is one thing that schools teach, from the lower grades to the highest, it is English. Why is it, then, that so few who have been well schooled have so little knowledge of this thing that they use daily? The thing by which often they are judged in their contacts in business?

out of school if we who are paying the bill have retained so little of what was taught us by teachers who were paid by others?

Schools are turning to greater emphasis upon fundamentals. Possibly that is a partial answer. At least such a move should result in some improvement.

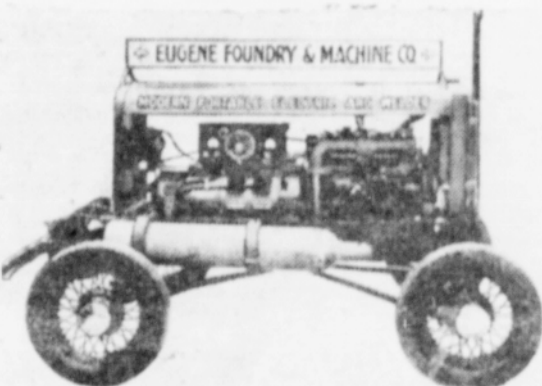
