"IN MY play, 'The Perfect Fool,' a few years ago, I performed what the public calls a mind-reading stunt.  
"Before I began my act, I always made sure to tell the audience that I did not believe in mind reading, that my act was the result of four years' study and mental training. 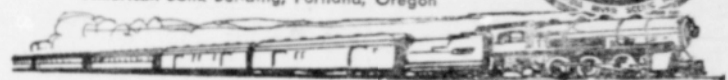
