32,000 MEN ARE IDLE DUE TO LUMBER STRIKE

Remainder of 51,000 Persons
Employed in Industry Re-
main on Jobs.

Portland, Ore.—A graphic picture
of employment loss due to strike
conditions in the Oregon and Wash-
ington west coast lumber industry
is contained in a district survey in
the current issue of the Four L
Lumber News.

"This survey," says the Lumber
News, "is not a mere guess or esti-
mate. It is the result of an exhaus-
tive plant-by-plant, district-by-dis-
trict contact with the operations
covered."

"In the west coast districts of
Washington, a total of 243 logging
operations and 418 lumber manu-
facturing plants (sawmills, planing
mills, shingle mills, plywood, door
and box factories) employed 34,495
men before the strike. Of this
number, 27,595 were idle because
of strike conditions on June 28.

"In Oregon west coast districts,
a total of 224 logging operations
and 339 lumbering manufacturing
plants employed 16,955 men before
the strike. Of this number, 4,440
were idle because of strike condi-
tions on June 28.

"Those unfamiliar with the lum-
ber industry may question the
statement that 553 Oregon opera-
tions employ only about half as
many men as do the 661 Washing-
ton operations. The explanation
lies in the fact that Oregon has
twice as many small camps and
mills as Washington, employing
fewer men per operation."

Elephant Tusks Are Teeth

The projections on an elephant
known as tusks are merely elon-
gated incisor teeth in the upper
jaw. If these teeth are broken off
or extracted they are never re-
placed. They are preceded by milk
teeth, which come out at an early
age. Good-sized tusks are produced
on both sexes of the African ele-
phant, but they seldom occur on the
females of the Asiatic or Indian spe-
cies. In Ceylon about 1 per
cent of either sex has tusks.

Keep Bulls Safe

Many good bulls are not kept in
herds long enough to prove their
worth because of the fact that they
become unruly and dangerous to
handle. If such bulls were provid-
ed with a strongly-built bull pen,
they could be kept indefinitely with-
out danger to the owner. Bull pens
should be built of strong material
so as to provide against breakage.
An enclosed stall with sliding door
which can be shut from the outside
can be provided to house the bull.—
Prairie Farmer.
