 Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Ritter, the G. D. Ritter family and Arthur and Art Wetzler picnicked on Little

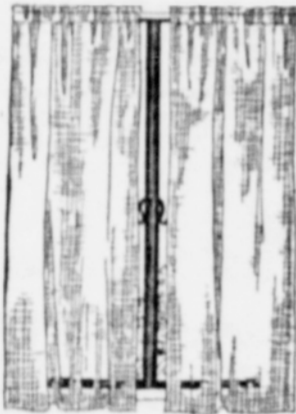

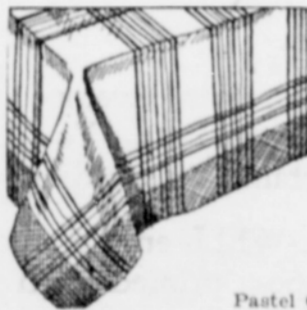
