STATE AID COMMISSION LISTS PROPERTIES

To put its various holdings back on the tax rolls is the object of a booklet issued by the World War Veterans State Aid commission in which are listed 410 farm properties taken over by the commission. All are outside of Multnomah county and range in price from \$125 for a Baker county holding to \$10,000 for a Harney county tract.

The commission also has listings of city properties which it wishes to put back on tax rolls.

Information on either kind of property may be secured from Claude B. Washburne, Junction City, Lane county representative of the commission, or from the commission's Salem office.
