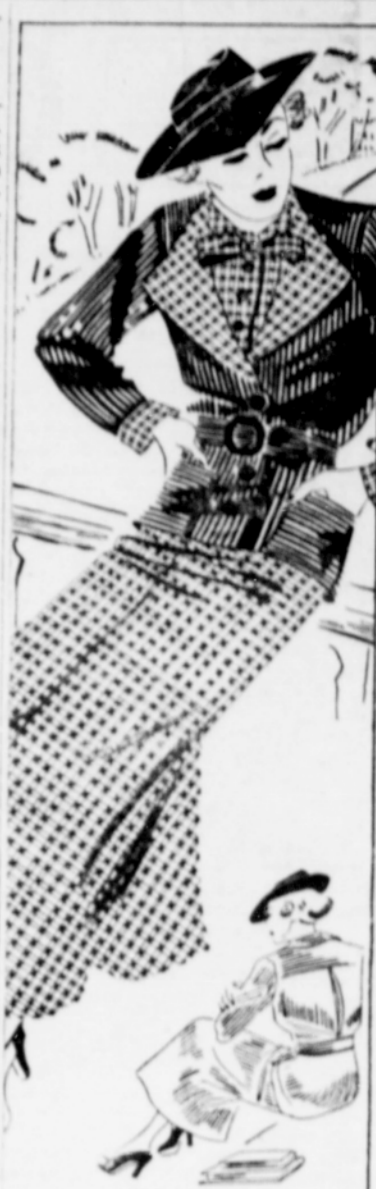
Pitcher Is Again Constable.
